STRATHBOGIE TABLELAND ACTION GROUP

At a recent meeting, committee members all expressed concern at the considerable delays and expenditure being experienced, particularly in relation to the Spring Creek Picnic Area and preparation for the forthcoming bushfire season.

Council has developed two designs in relation to access to the picnic area. However, in a letter to the CEO, STAG has reiterated previous advice that no further work should be undertaken until the issue of vehicle access to the old saleyards via the footpath has been resolved. Continued use of the footpath by vehicles will pose considerable danger to pedestrians, cause erosion and seriously hinder CFA trucks which fill at the creek.

STAG also expressed concern at the excessive amount of time (three years) and budget (\$40K) that it has taken for the project to reach its current stage.

STAG's letter to the CEO also drew attention to requests to address two issues that seriously impact on the safety of the Tableland community:

• Work (requested by the CFA Fire Captain in November 2019) to address the problem of dead trees on the Euroa/Strathbogie Road reserve which have the potential to block the major access and escape route from the township.

The water access point for the CFA on Mackrell's Lane has been cut off by the installation of Ancap safety railing.

On a brighter note, Council has set up a Zoom account for use by community groups and STAG has successfully used this for its latest meeting.

We understand that the footpath to be created from the township to the Rec Reserve will be extended to Brookleigh Road to link in with existing tracks and trails.

Hopefully it won't be too long before we can enjoy another pizza night. Plenty has been happening and is planned for the Rec:

- The tennis group have done a great job cleaning up the courts and competition is about to start
- The architects have arranged testing of the concrete at the pavilion in preparation for building works

Work is about to commence on the installation of the 200,000 gallon tank and backup generator to service the CFA.

STAG would also like to congratulate the History Group on their successful application for grant funding to be used for signage around the township.

Recipe of the Month

Spinach and Feta Filo Pie

Perfect for Spring with all the leafy greens coming on strong. From the Valmorbida Family.

Serves 4 - 6
100g pine nuts
5 large eggs
300g feta
30g cheddar
20g parmesan
1 tspn dried oregano
1 lemon's zest
Knob of unsalted butter
400g spinach / silver beet
270g pack filo pastry
Pinch cayenne

1 grated nutmeg

Olive oil

Method

Preheat oven to 200C

Dry roast pine nuts. Mix eggs and crumbled feta. Grate in cheddar and parmesan. Add cayenne,

oregano, zest, a lug of oil and nuts when golden.

Fry greens in butter and a little oil.

Brush oil over each sheet of filo.

Add the greens to the egg and cheese, mix well with grated nutmeg.

Fold the mixture into 4 layered

sheets of oiled filo. Bake in an oiled oven dish for 18 - 20 minutes or until golden on top.

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The Name Game: How much is enough?

Dreadnoughtus (see TT for September 2020) started me on a train of thought. If dinosaurs (and other species known only from incomplete fossil remains) can be described and given scientific names, how much of the creature do you have to have before you can attach a name to it? Do you need (say) at least half the skeleton, or could it be less? Might it depend on how informative the available remains are? If you had the skull, for instance, wouldn't that be likely to reveal a lot more than just a toe-bone could?

No doubt of that. But if your knowledge of anatomy is comprehensive enough, you might well be able to

deduce that the form of the toe-bone is characteristic of a particular group of species, but is identifiably different from all previously known members of the group. So you could then give it a name and a description – but why would you? What's the point (other than boosting your scientific profile)? Simply that you can then publish the name and description, making them available to all scholars in the field in the hope that one of them might find that bone associated with other parts of the skeleton, hence increasing the likelihood of gaining further information about whatever the creature is.



But what if you didn't have any part of the creature at all? Here's a case in point: in 1834, in sandstone deposits in Germany about 240 million years old, was discovered a series of animal tracks, the footprints clearly demarcated in the fine-grained stone. But they were very odd. Most conspicuous were imprints which, though a bit larger, looked rather like the impressions of human hands. In some cases, just in front of each large footprint was a much smaller but similarly shaped one. No bones, no other signs of life: just the tracks. Various scholars who looked at them suggested a bear or ape or unspecified marsupial origin,

but another school of thought was in favour of a reptile.



What to name the track-maker, then? In a paper published in the following year, a Dr Kaup argued that *Chirotherium* (sometimes spelled Cheirotherium) would be an appropriate genus name, the derivation being from Greek cheir, hand, and therion, beast, hence 'hand-beast'. He did acknowledge the lack of definitive information, however, by suggesting Chirosaurus ('hand-lizard') as an alternative, in case the lizard-lobbyists turned out to be right. It might be thought the height of cheek to give a name to a creature when you didn't know whether it was a reptile or a mammal (or for that matter something else altogether), but today's student of palaeontology would be able to gleefully point out that mammals had not yet appeared on

earth at the time in question.

So the case for *Chirotherium* being a reptile takes centre-stage. Eventual discoveries of tracks and associated remains in other parts of the world revealed the maker of the enigmatic footprints to have been an archosaur, a member of an ancient reptile group related to the dinosaurs. Like many carnivorous dinosaurs, it probably carried most of its weight on its large hindlimbs, with the much punier forelimbs touching the ground lightly or sometimes not at all.

However the name *Chirotherium* still carried the day: what a classic illustration of the nomenclatorial rule that a name cannot be changed simply because it turns out to be inappropriate. But at least, the next time you're playing Trivial Pursuit and the question *Why is an ancient reptile called a hand-beast*? comes up, you'll know the answer.

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the arsonist A MINI OF THE Chloe Hooper

The Bookshelf - notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

The Arsonist by Chloe Hooper, Penguin Random House, 2018

To read *The Arsonist* is unsettling. As another summer approaches, residents in rural Australia ponder what the high temperatures and abundant fuel loads might bring? At the front of people's minds are the deadly 2009 Black Saturday fires and the Black Summer fires of 2019 – only a year ago; older folk will perhaps also recall Ash Wednesday, 1983.

Bushfires are bad enough, but deliberately lit out-of-control bushfires can ignite emotions that can also threaten to get out of hand. Chloe Hooper tackles the highly sensitive issue of arson so deftly that it is fair to say the reader will look on all characters involved in the excruciating drama with a degree of sympathy – perhaps even the arsonist.

The setting is Churchill in the Latrobe Valley, an area of grinding, generational poverty and disadvantage, the highest rates of crime and domestic violence in the state of Victoria, and home to 40-year-old Brendan Sokaluk, a lonesome man whose perceptions of the world around him evince a disturbing childishness and simplicity; at the same time, Brendan Sokaluk demonstrates the ability to construct a narrative that allows him to be viewed as manipulative, even cunning. The reader is given the view of the fire that ignited in the Churchill area from a welter of perspectives: the detectives, the neighbours and Churchill community, Brendan's beleaguered parents; the lawyers; the fire experts, the police and, uncomfortably, the suspected arsonist himself.

The need for victims of arson-related bushfire to find a culprit is understandable, but it can also alert us to the potential that hatred on a communal level has the potential to alter the course of justice. This book raises some very strong questions, not least, how does a community ensure that lonesome individuals develop a sense of belonging to the group, a sense of reciprocity in being protected and protecting others, that, "in an age of fire, all of us are gatekeepers"?

The Arsonist is a powerful book, a reminder of the importance of community inclusiveness and the courage to accept difference – and that bushfire doesn't have favourites.

Fire and flood preparedness permit available for absentee landowners Key points

- Absentee landowners issued with a Fire Prevention Notice, or owning a property located in a Bushfire Management Overlay, can apply to travel to undertake fire-preparedness actions
- People whose properties may be affected by floodwater will be able to apply for permits should a significant rain event be forecast
- Permit conditions include a 72-hour time-limit and requirement to declare a return-date
- Metropolitan lockdown laws will apply for successful applicants

Strathbogie Shire has committed to balancing COVID-safe practices with ensuring all property-owners can prepare accordingly for the coming fire danger period. Council is encouraging non-resident landowners to use local contractors to undertake property clean ups wherever possible. A list of people can be found on the Strathbogie Shire website. Alternatively, the assistance of neighbours, family or friends.

Melbourne residents who own property within the Shire and have received a letter requesting them to attend to their property to reduce fire risk following an inspection recently undertaken by Council, or their property is located within a Bushfire Management Overlay, can apply for a permit to travel to undertake fire-preparedness actions. This may include mowing or slashing grass, clearing fallen branches and overgrown weeds, or general property maintenance. However, the permits come with strict conditions, including a 72-hour time-limit and a requirement to declare a return-date.

During the travel period, Melbourne property-owners need to abide by metropolitan lockdown restrictions, which include no visiting friends or local cafés.

In response to the Victorian Government announcement that paved the way for the permits, the Shire has created an online form, available on the Shire's website, through which applications can be submitted. Applicants need to provide details about the type of work to be carried out and outline the time-period. Council officers will aim to respond within five working days.

For anyone finding it difficult to undertake fire or flood preparedness action, the Shire encourages seeking out local contractors.

Celebrate National Recycling Week

LET'S RECYCLE RIGHT!

We conducted an audit on kerbside recycling material in your local Shire and these are the most common items found in the recycling bin which do not belong there.



SOFT PLASTIC PACKAGING

Take plastic shopping bags and food wrappers to the collection bins at your local participating supermarket. Otherwise, place all soft plastic packaging in your garbage bin.



RECYCLABLES IN PLASTIC BAGS

Place recyclables loose in your recycling bin to ensure they are recycled.



TEXTILES

Clothing, shoes, blankets and linen should be donated if in good condition or placed in the garbage bin if in poor condition.



POLYSTYRENE

Polystyrene doesn't go in your recycling bin at home because it breaks into small pieces and can't be sorted from other items.



BULKY ITEMS

These items cannot be recycled in your kerbside recycling bin. Take them to your local Resource Recovery Centre instead.


