



WHIPPING THE CREAM 'ROUND 'BOGIE - POST SCRIPT by Max Burnside

Sadly, this is the last instalment of Max's story of a day with him on a cream run around the Strathbogie's. We would like to thank Max very much for his riveting story, that has certainly stirred a few memories for many as well as providing a great insight into life up here during past times.

Quite a lot I did not mention in my reminiscence of the 'Although he checked his trap line twice a night I don't Strathbogie cream run. One event I shall never forget is that morning I had just left 'Bogie. I was just past the footy ground when the right hand stub axle broke clean off. The truck slowed to the right and came to rest against a large swamp gum. I was beside myself with worry. I walked to Dick Rowarth's yard to see if he had a spare vehicle that I could borrow or hire. Dick had no spares but he rang Jack Kibble. Jack arrived shortly with a near new J5 Bedford which he willingly loaned me, no strings attached and he had the forethought to fill the fuel tank for me. I had never met Jack before that day. How's that for country hospitality?

Although I never called on Phil Smart I would see him often. Phil was a great fisherman and he would walk for miles looking for little streams, dams or ponds that may hold a trout. I am quite sure Phil could catch a fish on a wet road. He was also well known as a rabbit! came down with a set of kitchen scales to weigh the trapper, a game in which he also excelled. Phil's ambition was to catch two rabbits per trap in one night.

know if he ever achieved his goal, but more than likely he did. I would often take his rabbits down to Murphy's in Euroa and the quantity was mostly 100 rabbits twice a week.

Quite often I would give people a lift to Euroa. Sometimes they were bush workers who had to collect a part or a vehicle, or to just quench their thirst, but mostly victims of a break down. Robby Mackrell was a regular passenger. I got to know Rob pretty well. We'd have a good old "chinwag." Another regular was an elderly man who lived in the Triangular Block bounded by the Kithbrook Road and Main 'Bogie Road. I have forgotten his name. I don't know how these people came back but I presume they used their thumb.

There was one very careful man on the run. He used to buy a half-loaf of bread twice a week and always loaf. This is a fact. (continued page 5)

In my twenty years on this run I faced some shocking weather. Some days I would be so wet that I "squellshed" when I sat in the truck. But in all that time I only saw snow falls on about five occasions, but bear in mind I was only up there two days out of seven. Early one morning, right at the Kelvin View turnoff a Spotted Quoll ran across the road. Years later I also saw one on the Longwood-Ruffy Road, the only two that I have ever seen. If one saw a kangaroo those days it was a talking point for a week. Quite different to the many hundreds about today. Koalas also were scarce then.

The ten gallon cream cans, if really full and including the weight of the can itself, weighed about one hundred pounds and I could throw them onto the truck with ease. Oh to be young again. Some cans were twelve gallon milk cans, hence being heavier; but because of their shape and better handles, were in fact easier to handle. As I stated earlier the whole of the run, except the 'Bogie Road, was gravel, very rough with springs, pot holes, wash outs etc. I would spend a lot of nights working on repairing/replacing broken centre bolts, wheel studs and springs.

Two local 'Bogie men that I had a lot of time for were Pat Millar and Eddie Einsporne. They were employed

by the Shire to do road maintenance. They would often catch me at the bakers and enquire as to the condition of certain springs, culverts etc. They did a good job considering the large area they had to cover. I had a chuckle at their expense one beautiful balmy spring morning. It was near Norm Watkin's place. Their truck was parked at a boggy patch but no men visible. I stopped for a chat and found them lying in the grass, both sound asleep. It was 10.30am and I reckoned that they had their smoko and drifted off, so very easy to do, particularly on a Spring Day. Spring Fever it's called. I walked over to them and yelled out "hey." Well they virtually erupted. They nearly knocked me over getting to their shovels. Took quite a fair while for them to forgive me. Real good blokes, both of them. It's quite sad how things change over time. I hardly know any "Bogie folk now; most have gone. But luckily the beautiful country remains, to all of you 'Bogie-ites. Here's to your good health. I wish you all well. Look after the country, and please, no more pines.

Potted history of the Strathbogie Golf Club

(Acknowledgements to member James (Jim) Gibson)

Club was formed on April 17th 1924, with golf having been played prior to that date but not as a club.

Initially it was a 6 hole course, then 9 in what was called the home paddock, with 6 in Simpson's and 3 in what is currently Brownlee's.

The club house was built in 1932 and the name on the gate was "Mossgiel" Prior to that the local store verandah was used. The club house was used as an observation point from 1942 till 1945.

During the war only 9 holes was used (the home paddock) until 1954. In 1969 the golf club purchased land 50 acres and steers grazed on the land to help pay for the course. Sheep were on the course until about 2000 helping to pay for improvements.

The club house was enlarged by purchasing two buildings – the Bogie South and West school rooms.

In 1984 we approached the new owners for ground to get another nine holes, but course architect Dick Pendlebury suggested that we forget the home paddock and build the entire course where it now stands. Those owners referred to, considered putting up a hotel/motel complex, but that did not eventuate and after some discussion we were to develop the course with some payment from them.

In 1991 the club house was moved to new premises and was enlarged and altered.

In 1992/93 a ten year lease was entered into.

In 1994 council wanted to sell the old paddock but members objected. (It had been put in council's name in the 70s so we might get some grant money).

In 2004 we finally bought the new course from the owners for \$300,000 and the old course was sold as well as surplus blocks on the new course. The extra money was raised from members and district people. We started the grass greens in the 90s and finished them in 2006. Neil Barter




Year 5-6 Camp
