





George Mackrell reminiscing about fires - interviewed by Dana Coleman

George: I've been chasing fires my whole life. Before they started the Strathbogie bushfire brigade, I was belting fires out with my father since I was 12.

Dana: How would the fires start?

George: Lightening or tractors, we never let them get very far. We didn't have much to belt them out with. Only a bit of bush, or a rake, if you had a knapsack you were lucky, these beaters we had, they had leather straps on, we'd belt it with that. Then they finally got kept that. I didn't sell that at the clearing sale. some small tanks to put on vehicles or trailers. I think it was about '44 when we got the new chev truck! and at least a 800gallon tank with a pump, I was driving that from when I was about 12.

D: Where was it kept?

G: For a start it was out on our place, dad put some double doors on the shearing shed, they had it there for a good many years.

D: Then where did it go?

G: Old Mr Laws sawmill yard donated the timber for the shed at Alex Crosbies on Haley Lane, off the Main St We had it near where the old butter factory used to be. Alex Crosbie had his trucks beside it. Then he built a chaff house inbetween ,of course all the rats got in didn't they?, we'd run in and we'd start bashing rats on the walls.

Then they decided they'd buy this old block off Simpsons over where the golf club used to be, they shifted it over there, they took the doors off, jacked it up, drove the fire truck in, put in some planks. They had some cement blocks in, they drove over and put her down. Where the golf club used to be. Then when the CFA came into it, they bought this block where the butcher used to be and the garage in

the early days, we finally got a new truck from the CFA, a 1310. 4x4. I drove that home from Ballarat. The:

shed, it was only a one door thing.

Then they started getting bigger trucks and of course

things had to be changed to get them in. They got this bigger shed and built it. I remember there was a big tree behind it, I had to get up in the excavator and cut it down with a chainsaw. It would be highly illegal these

Anyway they built all that there and made it what it is now. They had to make it higher for all the new trucks. I'm still in the CFA, they haven't kicked me out yet, they tried too. I still go down to the fires, I've still got the little unit on the back of my ute, I made sure I

Dana: How many fires do you remember up here in Strathbogie?

George: In the early days we had quite a few come this side. In those days as soon as we saw smoke we were gone.

Dana: Where would you go?

George: We'd go straight to where we saw the smoke, and lay into it. We'd belt away and so on there.

Dana: Did anyone get hurt in the fires.?

George: I'm trying to think, how the hell we didn't get burnt cos they didn't have cabs in those trucks, they actually cut the cabs off so you could see and talk with each other, we had about 800 gallons of water so we could go for a long time. I just don't remember There was an old man, he got caught in a fire coming from that side. He jumped into a waterhole with a snake and something else, he got a bit burnt. He crawled into my farm and I took him to Euroa Hospital. He didn't get killed or anything. Theres been a lot of close goes over the years.

Dana: Do you think its getting worse for fires? George: Yes and no...theres a lot made out of it as far as I'm concerned, 'get out get out'. When it's a bad day and nothings gonna stop it I guess that's the only thing you can do. I'm still a great believer in staving in the house till it catches on fire and then walking out while it burns around you. A lot of homes been saved by that. Depends how bad it is. To be continued

The Bookshelf: reading notes for the Bohomians Book Club

At the March meeting of the Bohomians Book Club members tackled a most demanding yet engaging work; The Luminaries by Eleanor Catton. First published in New Zealand, the book was picked up by the famous Granta Publishing house and subsequently won the Man Booker Prize the same year. The Luminaries is the longest book ever to win the prize and at 28 Catton is the youngest winner to date.

Catton is a graduate of the prestigious lowa Writers' Workshop; the alumni of which pride themselves on producing works of excellence, artistic élan and innovation. Apart from the convoluted and sometimes wayward plot the Bohomians discusses the themes and motifs employed. Thus, each of the twelve men we meet in the first chapter has an associated star sign that both 'illuminates' his character and his destiny. Set in New Zealand's Hokitika gold fields in 1866, a new arrival, Walter Moody, encounters the twelve becoming an uneasy thirteenth to be ensnared into a complex web of crimes. A lawyer, Moody is also the catalyst for unravelling the plot.



In the first part of the book Catton's highly crafted, complex sentences, some half a page long; lead the reader to believe that she has encountered a mid nineteenth century Victorian novel. However, the Bohomians discussed the possibility that The Luminaries had more in common with the experimental novels of the early twentieth century.

Two Press Releases from the Strathbogie Shire

"Strathbogie moves forward with historic draft budget announcement."

The Strathbogie Shire Council has released a land-mark Draft Budget and Council Plan (2014 Revision) for 2015/16 with its lowest rating increase in 21 years now on the table.

With a proposed rating increase of just 4 per cent with a Service Charge of \$126 per rate payer, Council is hoping to continue its path in building community confidence through sound financial management.

The 2015/16 Draft Budget and Council Plan see the introduction of an Organic Waste Service (third bin) and a \$6.9 million Capital Works Program that will provide approximately \$1.3 million in road reseals spread across the Shire.

The 2015/16 Draft Budget and Council Plan (2015 Revision) will now go out to the local community for comment and feedback. The focus of these documents is aimed at delivery of high priority community infrastructure items such as:

☐ Kirwans Bridge \$400,000

☐ Kelly's Bridge \$120,000

☐ High Street Violet Town Bridge Deck \$155,000

□ Longwood Oval \$30,000

☐ RSL Hall Euroa \$45,000

☐ Boho South Kitchen Refurbishment \$10,000

Strathbogie Mayor, Deb Swan said the "Council has looked internally rather than externally – to deliver a budget that takes into account the loss of the roads and bridges funding of \$1m per year. So essentially, this has been a difficult process to find cuts of up to

\$1.4 million out of operations without impacting on service delivery. In fact we are increasing our service deliv-

ery with the introduction of Organic waste collection." Mayor Swan went on to say that "green waste and tree management have both been community driven initiatives through local consultation."

Chief Executive, Steve Crawcour explained that significant restructures and shared services have delivered tangible results. "Achieving savings across the board is never an easy process. Our Shared Services agreement with Shepparton is already making great progress and by working together, we share the load in many areas."

"The Council Plan has already provided us with a clear direction and focus. We are delivering essential projects right across our municipality that will ensure the Strathbogie Shire has the infrastructure and amenity to become a destination of choice for families, businesses and investors supported happy local communities." Mayor Swan said "now it is time for the community to speak up and get involved in policy making. We urge our local residents to get involved, informed and become part of the process."
