More Reminiscences by Ken Dunnachie. Remember remember the 5th of November.

When I was a small boy growing up at Daylesford, Guy Fawkes Day was a big event. When starting to write this article, I wasn't sure how to spell Fawkes (always pronounced Forx). I asked one of my boys to look it up for me. Naturally out came his phone. Not only did he check on the spelling but he came up with a brief history of the event. This happened in the 15th or 16th Century and involved the House of Commons in London. Quite interesting if anyone cares to look it up. But to us kids, we didn't know anything about the History, it was just a big deal. We worked like beavers dragging small branches and rubbish from the surrounding bush. Our bonfire was on the edge of town. We tied rope around our waists and literally dragged our prize behind us.

Working after school and at weekends we managed to build quite a pile around our central pole. The mother of one of our gang made a dummy and getting towards the 5th we hoisted him up the pole. A bit like the Winterman, but totally different origins.

My brother and I were given one penny each for pocket money. Not much but with a half-penny we could buy a couple of lollies. Aniseed balls were my favourite. I used to buy them at the Bogie Store, 10 or so a week. One day Mr Levy must have got tired of counting them out so he kidded me into buying a box at a time. I have forgotten how many were in a box, but it was quite a step up.

As our Bonfire night came closer we saved our pennies to buy our Fire Crackers which of course was all part of the show. We got a bit jumpy as time got close in case some member of another gang came and set fire to our pile.

On the night, all our Mums and Dads came along and helped make it a big occasion. Us kids all had our own little bag of

crackers. There were one penny Bungers, Flower Pots, Jumping Jacks, Sparklers, and Catherine Wheels all helping to make it a night to "Remember".

Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP) - Strathbogie Golf Club

Earlier this year a proposal was put forward by community members in the Strathbogie area to relocate the current Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP) from the Golf Club to the Strathbogie Memorial Hall.

The matter was further discussed at a community meeting on June 15, 2015.

Following a presentation from Mr Paul Verbeek (CFA), and general discussions on the options available, attendees at this community meeting indicated clear and majority support for the NSP to remain at the Golf Club.

Council has accepted the community decision and will continue to recognise and support the Golf Club as the Neighbourhood Safer Place.

Should you wish to obtain additional information please do not hesitate to call Gary Washusen at the Strathbogie Shire on 1800 065 993.

Neighbourhood Safer Places (NSPs)

Neighbourhood Safer Places are a place of last resort. They should only be used if a resident's Bushfire Survival Plan fails and residents have no other place for shelter. Welfare facilities will not be made available and the place may not provide shelter from smoke and embers.

Neighbourhood Safer Places have a number of limitations:

- · They have limited capacity and provide no guarantee of safety;
- · They do not cater for animals;
- · There is no expectation that emergency services will be present;
- They do not provide meals, amenity or cater for special needs (eg. Infants, the elderly, the ill or the disabled);
- · They may not provide shelter from the elements, particularly flying embers;
- There are risks to people during access, shelter during passage of the fire front and egress from the Neighbourhood Safer Place.
- They are NOT a Fire Refuge, Relief Centre, Recovery Centre, Assembly Area, or informal Places of Shelter, each of which
 has a different and specific purpose.

Stargazing in Strathbogie



Richard Nolle's definition of a Supermoon is a new moon or full moon that has come within 361,836 kilometers of our planet, as measured from the centers of the moon and Earth.

By that definition, the year 2015 has a total of six supermoons. The first supermoon, for 2015, came with the January 20 new moon. The new moons on February 18 and March 20 were also supermoons. The full moons of 30th August, 28th September and 27th October will also be supermoons.

"Weeds and Pest Management Program best in State."

The Victorian State Government has recently announced the continuation of the Roadside Weeds and Pest Management program, with an amount of \$53,378 p.a. to be allocated in the Strathbogie Shire over the next two years of 2015-16 and 2016-17.

Strathbogie Shire Mayor, Deb Swan explained "this is good news for our local community, with the program being jointly managed by the Department of Economic Development, Jobs, Transport and Resources (DEDJTR) and our local Landcare Groups. "

"The aim of this program is the containment and reduction of regionally controlled weeds and the control or eradication of rabbits on Council roadsides."

Kerri Robson, Landcare project officer of the Gecko Clan Landcare Network said the "program is undoubtedly the most successful in the State, due to good communication and a real team effort between the Shire, DE-

DJTR and Landcare Groups."

"Funds are going directly into the areas where it needs to be delivered. Landcare groups have the practical knowledge needed to manage the areas – on the ground, they know what the problems are and can identify priorities and get the job done."

DEDJTR Biosecurity Area Leader, Greg Wood said "the Strathbogie community was quick out of the blocks with an innovative partnership program that has already achieved significant reductions in roadside pests, despite the impact of the 2014 Creighton's Creek Fire."

"It is expected that the same partnership arrangement between Landcare Groups and the Shire will continue for the next program."








Strathbogie Campus AUGUST 2015




