

# STAG news - Popular Project

At the community engagement dinner, people proposed 35 projects that they would like to see happen on the Tableland. The most popular one was the sealing of the Strathbogie/Merton road, with a total of 26 votes. There are a number of reasons why this project may not get up. Firstly, nobody put their name down to work on this, so nothing will happen unless somebody does. Apart from that, it has been tried before and was not successful because most of the road is in the Mansfield Shire and at that time Mansfield Shire Council showed little interest in sealing the road. The amount of traffic on this road was not considered great enough to fund sealing the road as well. So saying, it is obviously important to a number of people on the Tableland and if anyone wants to pursue this further they should get in touch with STAG.

# Strathbogie Tableland Action Plan

The community action plan has been worked on since the community engagement dinner, and a draft action plan circulated to all who attended and to other interested residents. From the list of things people want to see happen over the next 10yrs, and the projects proposed on the night, the STAG committee has identified 6 themes. These themes will be included in the action plan and projects organised around them. The themes are Transport, Health (including the needs of older people), Environment, Township, Arts and History.

# **Project Planning Meeting**

Everyone who elected to work on one or more projects proposed at the community dinner was invited to a recent planning meeting. Twelve people turned up on a cold wet night to plan various projects. Four people started work on the new residents kit (Environment theme) and another four discussed putting a brochure together for a self-guided tour of former school sites on the Tableland. (History theme) The idea of a history lunch was discussed with reference to the 'history cafe' that takes place in Alexandra once a month. Themeda talked about the art group (an idea proposed by Them at the dinner) which is now up and running and meets on the second Sunday of each month at the Rec Ground from 2-5pm; people bring along art pieces they are working on and enjoy doing this in the company of others.





# Written by Ken Dunnache......I recently had a chat with Ian Beattie about early times and how they managed.

Three Beattie brothers selected land in the early days about 1860. Jack and Daisy lived in Beattie's Road and sailor Jack lived with them until 1931. Sailor Jack was nicknamed Sailor as he had served in the Merchant Navy round about the First World War.

When Ian was born they moved up to Shields Lane in 1926 onto a property of about 130 acres. Eventually five children were born here. Daintie still lives in Alexandra.

They milked 18 cows by hand. The cream at that time went by train down to Kilmore Butter Factory as they paid a better price than the Euroa Factory. These cows were run on a neighbour's paddock. Eventually the cream went to the Strathbogie Factory once or twice a week by horse and cart. The Factory burnt down in the early 1930's and rebuilt again.

lan did four years schooling by correspondence. This, of course, threw a lot of responsibility on the parents, particularly the mothers. He then went to the Kelvin View school, where he and the subsequent family walked four miles both ways each day; a very long way for children.

His father, and eventually the boys, grew about three acres of potatoes using an old Fordson Detroit tractor with steel wheels. The plough had a seat and they rigged another seat as well. Using a three furrow plough, one person dropped a spud down a tube into the middle furrow and other put a ring of fertilizer around it. They were harvested by hand and sold for 10/- a bag (\$1) at the old Beehive Store near the overpass in Euroa.



Jack did some rouseabouting among neighbours. They ran about fifty sheep. After milking in the morning they went out and cut ferns with a fern hook until milking at night.

Sailor Jack was M.C. at the local dances in the old hall (Doug's Garage.) The music consisted of the violin, piano and drums. Sometimes Barry Ellis joined in with his saxophone. They didn't have any power so it was all lanterns with lighting kero. The hall had a kero tank on the outside wall with a pressure pump which fed the main light in the hall. When the light got a bit dim someone went outside and pumped it up again. The non dancers went out the back room and played cards. This tradition was carried on when the new hall was built.

Not having any power at home meant all lights were lanterns and hurricanes. They eventually got a 12 volt system with a one horsepower Briggs & Stratton motor. Then came a Ferguson Tractor with hydraulics and rubber wheels. What a difference that would have made.

What rabbits they didn't eat were sold. First the skins; they were stretched on a wide frame until they dried. Then Harris's opened a freezer in Euroa about 1960 and they took the whole rabbits. These were sold for 1/6- a pair (30 cents.)

Their first car was an old Buick then a Renault. For a while they had a motor bike and a side car. Ian remembers setting out on a jaunt with mum and dad on the bike and four kids in the side car. What fun they must have had but also it would have been very hot and very cold. Mr. John Croome was the baker at the time in the township. The oven is still in existence in the main street.

During this conversation lan mentioned the new road. I said "here, hand on a minute, what's this new road?" He said he could first remember it being made in 1929 using horses, scoops, drays, picks and shovels. Then Jim Gibson joined in and said his father worked on it in 1922. So much for the new road!!! The old road is still there starting just below Dennis and Di Mackrell's and going past the Strathbogie Cemetery. Some of the older cars had trouble climbing the hill. Ian said Beatties Road and Delaheys Road were the same road right through. Hard to imagine now but the "new road" cut through a couple of paddocks and changed things around a bit.

lan, Bob and Neil went fruit picking through the season in the Goulburn Valley to supplement the farm income.

The football team (known as "The Hillmen") were active and there was always a dance after most local games with a Ball at least every year. New years eve was a big night out with a combined tennis and cricket club dance.

I found that early history very interesting and we certainly have to take our hats off to these early settlers as they managed to rear a family and eke out a living in those early days. They still managed to go to the local football match and a dance at night. Imagine the fun they had. No amplifiers in those days. They didn't need them.



During the fifties at dances in the new hall there were so many people doing the Barn Dance we had to make two circles around the hall. All the children joined in which is how they learned to dance.

Thanks to Ian for these memories and wishing him a happy retirement in Euroa. Ken Dunnachie



floor. Thankyou to everyone who came and participated.




