Fire Restrictions Over, Danger Remains

Although the Fire Danger Period for the municipalities of Greater Shepparton, Moira and Strathbogie is over, the threat of fire in the landscape is still a present danger. Due to dri-

er than usual conditions for this time of year, people are advised it is easy to lose control of burn-offs.

CFA District 22 Community Education Coordinator, Fiona Ritchie said "With the extra dry conditions lingering people need to realise it's easier to lose control of a burn-off. Take care and have water readily available at all times and ensure your burn is 100% out before you leave it. Also NEVER leave your burn -off unattended, this goes for small backyard bonfires in drums too."

Check with your local council to make sure you're allowed to burn off. Some councils have regulations and Local Laws to adhere to. Burning off grass, stubble, weeds, undergrowth or other vegetation is generally permitted outside the Fire Danger Period, however Local Laws on burn-offs can apply yearround. To be on the safe side it's best to check with your local council before lighting up.



Hello Again Everyone,

I would like to take the opportunity to update you on some of the happenings at your Council.

Flood Recovery

All tenders for the approximately \$6 million of damage to Shire infrastructure, following the significant rainfall event in early December, have now been awarded. Work has started on the repairs and will continue through the winter. It was originally hoped that work could be completed by June, before the bulk of the winter rainfall, but while several tenders were submitted for the project, most were uncompetitive on price. Consequently, only two organisations were awarded projects which will stretch out the project timeframe.



Roads Advisory Committee

Maintenance of the road network is arguably the most important function of Council. It certainly represents the largest item of Council expenditure. This Council felt that it was important for the community to have a greater say in the maintenance priority of our road network and has formed a Roads Advisory Committee.

Nominations are invited for three community positions on the committee. The committee will be asked to provide advice on roads policy and strategy. The Council invites expressions of interest from community members who have qualifications and/or practical experience in civil engineering.

Swimming Pools

The Shire's swimming pools are a major recreational asset and are much appreciated by Tableland community members who use the pools in Euroa and Violet Town. You may recall a survey was sent to all households 4 years ago, asking us for our thoughts on the future of the pools.

Committed community members have joined/formed 'friends of the pools' groups and a Shire-wide pools working group. These groups have been instrumental in completing upgrades to the facilities.

But the major considerations still exist for Council. Essentially there are three:

Despite residents having free admission, attendance at the 4 pools totalled 36,000 over the past summer. With operating expenses of around \$330,000 this means that it cost ratepayers \$9 for each visit. Do residents want

to maintain this position?


The management of the pools is problematic. There is limited community involvement in the management at most pools and contracts do not have any incentive for investment in the pools. Consequently, there are limited features and programs to increase patronage.

The pools are ageing. The pools average almost 50 years of age and are going to start requiring very large amounts of capital spending to extend their lifespan.

A very comprehensive report has been prepared and is open for public comment until 22nd June. The report is available from the Shire's website or available for review at Council Offices/Libraries. Council will consider all comments when it meets to review the future strategy for the pools.







Our mother, our birth mother, who birthed us all into creation and who we affectionately call '*Mumma E*', our Mother Earth.



APPLY TO PICK YOUR COMMUNITY PROJECT

Victorian residents aged 16 and over will be able to submit their idea for consideration under the *Pick My Project* program backed by \$30 million from the *Victorian Budget 2018/19*. Any idea that helps build a stronger community, and has the backing of a local organisation, community group, school, local council, or other eligible group to help is possible.

Ideas could include anything from sporting and recreation infrastructure, community arts projects, improvements to community facilities or the local environment. Projects need to be feasible & have land-owner consent, but without restrictive guidelines many local priorities that fall-between the cracks of other grant programs will be eligible.

Detox Your Home" from chemicals safely

Have you got household chemicals that you need to dispose of?
Strathbogie Shire residents are be-



ing urged to 'Detox your Home' – a safe, free and easy-to use service to dispose of common, highly toxic household chemicals without harming your health or the environment.

The household chemical collection program is coming to Mitchell Shire Council's Seymour Works Depot (behind Seymour Sports & Aquatic Centre) on Saturday 2 June between 10am-2pm.

Strathbogie Shire Waste Engineer Darren Ritchie is encouraging residents to make the most of the Seymour event as it is currently the closest collection program for Strathbogie Shire residents to dispose of their household chemicals- like pesticides, detergents and weed killers.

"Chemical wastes of any kind cannot be accepted at any of Strathbogie Shire Council's Waste Transfer Stations, so the collection event occurring in Seymour provides the best opportunity for our residents to dispose of their unwanted toxic household chemicals," Mr Ritchie explained.

The chemicals dropped off are immediately sorted and placed in sealed drums and are then transported to a specialist waste treatment facility. The majority of chemicals collected are either recycled or used for energy recovery. The small amount that can't be used for these purposes are stored in EPA approved secure landfills.

Strathbogie Roadside Weed Management: a State, Shire and Landcare Collaboration

Tableland residents may have seen contractors controlling weeds in roadside vegetation over the last few summers. So, what's this all about?



Strathbogie Shire is funded by the State Government to control targeted weeds on roadside reserves. All Landcare areas in the Shire get a portion of the funding received from the State. Though the primary weed focus in our district is on blackberry, other species are also targeted, e.g. briar rose, St. John's wort, Paterson's Curse, saffron thistle, tree of heaven.

This funding acknowledges that roadsides are not only a potential reservoir and dispersal ground of weed species, but also that native vegetation along roadsides has intrinsic value and is important habitat for native wildlife. Many roadside reserves in our Shire harbour the only native vegetation in an entire district.

We all have an interest in a balanced approach to managing roadside vegetation. State legislation sets the rules governing vegetation management on roadside reserves and local government implements the rules. It's desirable to use weed management to reduce fire risk and improve native habitat along a roadside reserve, something this program contributes to. However, in a landscape that is predominantly cleared and where roadside vegetation is sometimes the only native habitat that remains, clearing native vegetation can have disastrous effects on local flora and fauna and catchment health.

The roadside weeds program is managed by Strathbogie Shire, which distributes the ~\$50,000 annual allocation amongst Landcare group areas in the Shire. Project coordinators in each Landcare area work with the contractor to prioritise roadsides for treatment and ensure only the target weed species are controlled. In the Strathbogie Tableland Landcare area, the project is managed by Landcare Committee members David Jamieson, with occasional help from Bert Lobert. Program reporting includes: the area controlled, weed species treated and treatment method. Unfortunately, on-going funding for this program is uncertain.

David consults with the contractor on location re control method and timing and to identify and manage new and high priority sites. Chemical control is the usual form of treatment. Contractors are made very aware that treatment does not extend beyond the roadside reserves into private land (which may also be a weed harbour) or sensitive habitats such as wetlands and riparian zones. Landcare group representatives then check on outcomes to ensure ongoing confidence in the process. This occurs season by season, establishing the need for follow up and moving into areas of new infestation.

A further benefit of local Landcare involvement in this Shire-led program, is to extend the reach of the program by groups allocating their own funds to increase the number of weed species being targeted and to undertake control works in areas not on roadsides. For example, Strathbogie Tableland Landcare's own funds have enabled the control of invasive environmental weeds such as cherry laurel, spurge, English holy, honeysuckle and English ivy, both on roadsides and along riparian environments, public reserves and tracks. For most weeds, several years of control are needed to achieve a lasting reduction in infestations and supplementing the Shire program with local funds will better enable that to occur.

Some invasive species, such as cherry laurel, can be prolific and resistant to standard control methods. Their treatment may require the use of more potent chemicals and has the consequent risk of collateral damage. Assessing the efficacy of a prescribed treatment regime (on target and non-target species) is carried out by Landcare group volunteers. Assessment is an important part of any weed control program and gives confidence that the techniques used are efficient and reliable and not causing additional problems.

We are now entering the third year of this latest Roadside Weed Management Program. Selected sites on the initial priority list have been treated and revisited. New sites reported and identified in drive-bys are receiving attention. The improvements are becoming clear. Roadside infestations of woody weeds such as blackberry and broom have diminished, but require follow-up. When looked at in conjunction with our Landcare group's on-going work in riparian and pedestrian access areas across the district, Strathbogie roadsides are increasingly woody weed free and providing healthier habitat.

There will never be enough dollars to control all woody weeds and the roadside reserves will need ongoing treatment. We hope that by tackling heavy infestations, the benefits of treatment to the broader environment will become clear, encouraging all landholders to take an interest in weed management on adjacent private property, treating garden escapees and caring for 'their' roadside.

Peranbin Primary College Strathbogie Campus




