

An Invitation to Strathbogie Tableland Residents WILL YOUR DECISIONS MADE DURING A BUSHFIRE EMERGENCY BE BASED ON SOUND KNOWLEDGE AND PRACTISES?

CFA North East Community Safety Team are preparing to run the core Community Fireguard Program once again on the Strathbogie Ranges.

Community Fireguard (CFG) is a community development program designed by CFA to help reduce the loss of lives and homes in bushfires and build community resilience.

History shows that bushfires in Victoria are extremely dangerous. If residents take responsibility for their bushfire safety and prepare themselves, they can reduce their risk. While a community can do many things to improve safety and minimise loss from major bushfires, even well-prepared properties can become undefendable under certain conditions.

What is CFG?

CFA acknowledges the complexities of bushfire management, and assists Community Fireguard groups to develop survival strategies that consider various scenarios.

A trained CFA facilitator guides the CFG group through the core program. The six meetings are as follows:

- ⇒ Introduction to Community Fireguard
- ⇒ Living in a high-risk environment Understanding fire and its implications for you
- ⇒ Personal safety and resilience
- ⇒ Preparing your property for bushfire
- ⇒ Creating your Bushfire Survival Plan
- ⇒ Reviewing Bushfire Survival Plans.

How does it work?

The Group decides the frequency and the timing of meetings to fit in with

each other and the facilitator's current commitments. We meet at someone's property for roughly an hour and a half, explore the topic and discuss it in relation to your property in a particular location, with its specific vegetation. We then look at fire prevention initiatives the host couple/ individual/ family have set up on their property learning from their preparations. If acceptable to each participant we then meet at another property, allowing each participant in turn to host a meeting and show what they've done to protect themselves from bushfire.

When?

The program in Strathbogie will take place during March and April 2017. Once the core program is completed, members will be assigned to one of the current Community Fireguard Groups already established in Strathbogie- the one closest to your property.



Magiltan Ck and Spring Ck Weed Control

This is the upstream extension of the woody weed control project along Spring Ck. We've engaged contractors to control the woody weeds, mainly blackberry, holly, honeysuckle and briar

STRATHBOGIE TABLELAND ACTION GROUP NEWS

Council Plan re Action Groups

Most of you will be aware from previous editions of Tableland Talk that Council is considering disengaging Community Action Groups, that is they will no longer be Section 86 Committees of Council (which effectively removes volunteer insurance) and will not receive funding from Council.

Under the new model it is envisaged that informal project teams will form to undertake individual projects. Projects must have a whole of community focus, enjoy a good level of support among the local community and must be within the capacity of local communities to achieve within their own resources. These project teams may apply to Council for funding and Council will advise on insurance issues on a project by project basis.

STAG has had several meetings with Shire representatives and expressed concern that this format would seriously disadvantage the smaller communities. The larger towns have established (and usually incorporated) sporting and service organisations which would be well equipped to undertake projects. The committee believes that it is unlikely that small project teams will be created in our community to undertake projects with a whole of community focus, probably no volunteer insurance and no seed funding. While project teams may apply for grant funding from the Shire and/or other organisations, it is usually a requirement that the applicant also contribute.

While the Shire has requested feedback from the community, the questions relate to operational aspects of the Action Group with which it is unlikely community members will be familiar, such as the obligations of the committee and the Instrument of Delegation which is an agreement with the Shire for the operation of the Action Group.

We believe it would give a more accurate understanding of the implications of the proposed remodel to ask:

To what extent to you believe members of the community will form project teams that fit within the above guidelines?

How would you envisage project teams funding projects

- i) if they are unsuccessful in achieving funding from Council; and
- ii) if they are seeking funding (either from the Shire or externally) which requires them to make a financial contribution

STAG Submission to Council Plan 2017

STAG made the following submission to the Council Plan 2017 and reiterated our belief that it would be far more advantageous to both the Shire and the smaller communities for them to work more closely together.

Community Engagement

That Council continue to support and engage with local communities through the Community Action Groups, particularly in the smaller towns. Council to work closely with Action Groups to improve the existing model.

Review customer service procedures: listen to issues raised rather than immediately justifying

Emergency Planning

With the increased risk of bushfire through climate change, that Council liaise with other organisations such as CFA, SES, Police, etc. to work with communities to develop bushfire preparedness at the start of each fire season, particularly in the extremely vulnerable townships of Strathbogie and Ruffy

Introduce fire protection measures for át risk 'communities, regular slashing of roadsides, fire tracks, etc.

Sustainability

Investigate and support alternative energy options, consider solar panels on all Shire premises Investigate options to provide potable water in the Strathbogie township

Closely monitor applications for new bores

Communication

Work with local communities, adjoining shires, telcos and federal and state politicians to improve the telecommunication service on the Tableland.

Transparency

Review the percentage of Council activities/decisions which are "in confidence"

Road Management

Address dangerous intersections on the Tableland

Review current practices in relation to roadside spraying and align to the climatic conditions of specific locations

Review and address issues relating to clearance of roadsides; consider introducing incentives for landowners to manage their own roadside area.

Agriculture

Consider the reintroduction of Rural Land Rebate to reduce the increased infestation of weeds Investigate ways to assist/enhance primary production –facilitate workshops, information sessions, etc.


Future Planning/Business Development

Seek investment from suppliers of aged care, accommodation, medical facilities, rehabilitation facilities, etc. (in Euroa)

Community invited to meeting on the future management of Euroa Cinema to be held on 15th March—7pm

Cinema-goers are invited to a public meeting with Strathbogie Shire Council to discuss the option of giving the Euroa Community Cinema to the community to operate and manage.

A meeting on Wednesday (March 15) will aim to inform community members of the following:

- Public participation and community control allows the community to be engaged and empowered with the operational functions and direction of the Euroa Community Cinema.
- The proposal has been presented to the Euroa Community Cinema Operating Committee, exploring a number of different operating models.
- The community will manage the cinema as an incorporated entity, with elected positions such as President, Vice-President, Secretary/Treasurer and various sub-committees focusing on film selection, ticketing, projection and more.
- Council will still own the cinema but complete operation and control lies with the community.

Strathbogie Shire Mayor Amanda McClaren said Council looked forward to hearing the outcomes of the community meeting. "This is a real opportunity for the cinema-goers, and broader community, to be empowered to run the cinema by the community, for the community," she said. Based on feedback from the community meeting, a recommendation will be made to Council and if successful, an Expression of Interest for Committee positions process will commence.

Once this committee is assembled, training will begin, as will the official handover from Council.

Strathbogie Memorial Hall

The Strathbogie memorial Hall has recently had a facelift. The hall was opened in 1956, and at the time of building was painted with a bitumen style sealant which had worn and weathered over the past 60 years. So it has now had a new coat of paint after the external walls were pressure washed, all cracks filled and then primed and undercoated.

Fans have recently been installed in the supper room after the local yoga groups petitioned strongly to have these fitted. New windows will be fitted to replace the rotting timber sash windows.

Early last year, the ceiling had insulation installed, and an energy audit was also conducted.
