

Integrated Rabbit Control and Sustainability

Our environment, its diversity and hence our ability to maximise agricultural production is critically dependent upon controlling rabbits. Rabbits do huge damage to both environment and agriculture.



One rabbit per hectare is enough to eliminate the natural revegetation of plants. This is not a lot of rabbits, but if you see a rabbit, we have a problem. Seven rabbits consume as much as one fine wool merino wether. If there are seven rabbits in one hectare, it decreases income by about \$100 per hectare. If a thoroughbred

horse breaks a leg in a burrow, imagine the financial loss.

Integrated rabbit control is needed over time to successfully control rabbits. The initial investment might be large, but the long-term benefits will be greater. One of the benefits in getting rabbits to manageable levels is that time required to control rabbits is reduced significantly. This enables the farmer more time for more productive work.

Integrated rabbit control requires the following actions:

Monitor rabbit numbers ... count them on a spotlight transect Locate rabbit burrows ... map them

Reduce the rabbit population ... disease and physical control Destroy rabbit burrows ... ripping & monitor the treated burrows Monitor the rabbit numbers ... count again

Measure the success ... by numbers remaining, not decreases If all these actions are rigorously implemented in successive years rabbits are controllable in rural land holdings.

The landholders and managers in the Granite Creeks Project area have been responsible for huge successes in rabbit control. The Gooram Valley Landcare Group has been a part of that and has data that shows this success spanning 25 years since the first release of RHDV in 1995. An 18 km spotlight transect was set up in 1995 and has been maintained since. In 1996 the total number of rabbits counted was 1017 rabbits ... in 2018 the count was 13 rabbits. These low numbers must be maintained and preferably reduced further.

The main challenges for us all now in maintaining this level of achievement is to have our community realise that we cannot believe that the problem is solved. Look at what happened after the impact of myxomatosis when integrated rabbit control was not used ... rabbit populations rebounded quite quickly. One pair can produce 4-12 kits monthly. As pointed out in a recent letter to the editor, K5 is only a part of the picture: it is not the answer in itself.

A field day to demonstrate how to implement integrated rabbit control is to be held on Saturday May 12th (See p12 advertisement for detail).

Another part of the challenge is how to control rabbits in urban and peri-urban areas. Everybody should understand that if they see a rabbit, we have a rabbit problem: it must not reach 1017 rabbits for us to realise that we have a problem!







Hello Again Everyone,

I would like to take the opportunity to update you on Council matters.

ANZAC Day. I was privileged to represent the Shire at the commemoration of ANZAC Day in Strathbogie on Monday 23rd April and at the Dawn Service in Violet Town. The Strathbogie commemoration was a credit to the students and staff of the Peranbin Strathbogie campus and a special thank you to the parents for catering for Morning Tea.

Flood Recovery

On Tuesday 24th April the Shire awarded contracts for the bulk of the estimated \$7 million of infrastructure repairs following the 200+ mm of rain in early December. There is still one bundle of works to be tendered, but with the contracts awarded, work can finally start on the 1000+ defects logged across the Shire.

Budget for 2018/2019

At the Council Meeting on 24th April the draft Budget for the 2018/2019 financial year was approved. Council will consider contributions from the community before finalising the Budget. I would like to highlight some excerpts that particularly impact the Tableland.

- 1. The Victorian government has capped the increase for council rates at 2.25%. The Strathbogie Shire is proposing an increase of 1.9%.
- 2. The Council is recommending an increase in the Farm Rate discount from 15% to 17.5%. This represents a saving of almost \$100 per annum for the average farm in the Shire.
- 3. Each year properties in the Shire are revalued by the Victorian Valuer General. In 2018 a strong increase in property values has been recorded. Farm valuations have increased by 13% and residential properties by 17%. Changes in property value do not impact on the total revenue raised by the Council, but does affect the split in the burden of rates borne by residential and farm properties.
- 4. The annual charge for the 'three bin service' will increase to \$530. The Budget has not made provision for any potential increased costs from the national recycling crisis that has emerged from China's restrictions on importing co ☐mingled recyclables. The Shire's contractor has requested a significant increase in charges to handle recycled material. The

Shire's position, is that under the current contract, it is the contractor's responsibility to absorb the increased charges. State and Federal Environment Ministers met in late April to formulate plans on how Australia will



5. Total capital spending will be \$10.3 million of which \$6.5 million will be spent on roads, bridges, drains and footpaths. For the Tableland this means that the 50% increase in grader capacity introduced in 2017/18 is maintained (more roads graded, more often), the rollout of the 'Zero to One' Roads program improving 'zero rated' roads from no maintenance to being regularly maintained continues and the entrance to the Strathbogie Hall will be sealed.

The draft Budget and Council Plan is on public display until 31 May and will be improved by your comments and suggestions.

PINING FOR THE STRATHBOGIE FOREST OF 50 YEARS AGO: A WARRENBAYNE VALLEY PERSPECTIVE

The local dance was well-known to the surrounding districts for its lively dancing live music and delicious home cooked suppers. Because the terrain through Davies Track was so difficult, the Department allowed us to trade and I took Tony's posting to Benalla 31. The significance of this will become apparent later. Tony enjoyed the trek through the forest and the beautiful community. We purchased the Old Post Office Cottage with a determination to raise our family in this happy healthy community. Our first daughter Rachael was born in 1972 and a small play group was formed for the growing community of new families of the district.

To the Editor,

My name is Bobbie D Downes (spelt with an e), Not to be confused with the other Downs, up near Mt.Wombat. I live at the end of Downes Lane in Strathbogie. I'm 88 years old and a forth Generation farmer. So I know a bit about the world.



I am writing to you on the topic of neighbours. If you know me and the area, you will know I have four neighbours bordering my property. Three of the neighbours have been here almost as long as the Downes. To the North, there's the Uptons. The South, there's the Freemans. To the West, closer to town on Downes Lane, is the Ploughman's. Just recently, to the shock of us all, the Gossips decided to sell up. Geoff Gossip moved on to a better place. Old GG, as he was known, apparently just took up and left off. Someone said they thought he went to the Gold Coast. Others say the Sunshine Coast. So for the first time in my life I was to have a new neighbour. To be honest, I was concerned. It can be unsettling when change comes around. Momma used to say, "Change was blown' in the wind". I never really understood what she meant by that. I asked Daddy. But he never said much.

I was walking the cows down the bottom of Downes Lane when I first spotted them. My new neighbours. It was almost the exact spot where I first saw my dear wife Ida, 70 years earlier. Downes Lane runs West to the East and crosses a little creek, it does continue past, but is not much more that a goat track now that it enters the old Gossip property. Just my side of the creek is Gossips Lane. It runs North/South, with the creek crossing the lane back to the South as it runs down through and past the old Gossip homestead.

My mind has travelled back to 1952. An Autumn day, not unlike this one today. I was listening to the trickle of the stream and listening to the birds, listening to trees, listening to the wind. I was having a mighty ol' time. Conversations in nature going on all around me. Low and behold I spotted the most gorgeous girl I'd ever seen. It was the single most beautiful image I'd seen in my entire life. I must have been all of about 18 years old. Oh my goodness, there was Ida. Ida Louise, She was beautiful. She was riding her beautiful bay mare named 'Kloppy'.

So, Ida was riding along on this fine bay mare and her hair was blown about in the breeze. It was then I knew she was gonna be my wife.

Anyway, I was in exactly the same place 70 years in the future, now, a day just like today, when I first spotted them. My new neighbours. Sunshine had hair just like Ida, maybe a little longer, definitely a little scruffier. And Curly, a wild bushranger type, with a huge smile and equally scruffy look. That was my first impression of them. Those big smiley faces, eyes beaming bright. Like there wasn't a care in the whole world. Ida had that same look, the day I first spotted her riding 'Kloppy' down by the creek.

I want to tell you about the next time I saw Ida. It was a month later at the famous 1952 Strathbogie Show. The show that stopped the nation we used to say. Back in them days it was a massive deal. Ferris wheel, shooting galleries, fairy floss. More fun than you can even imagine. I was there showing my prize bull 'Dangles'. Big black Angus, the envy of all and the sire of any decent cow in the Ranges. Of course, 'Dangles' won the show, forth year running. This year was my favourite year. 1st prize was a kiss from the prettiest girl who won the needlework competition. And of course that wonderful kiss came from Ida. Ida preferred to work with a hook as opposed to tatting, working with a shuttle. That was hers mum's speciality. Ida preferred to crochet her bedspreads and her mum was OK with it because Ida always won !st prize for her stunning work.

We finally got the blessing from her mother and ol' GG and our courtship begun. GG's only concerns were that if we wed, Ida's name would become Ida Downes. It made him laugh till he nearly fell over. Ida would say "Daddy darling, my name is Ida Louise Gossip, Ida L Gossip. I've getting a ribbing my whole life at school since prep. Even at church. So, Ida Downes will make a nice relief from all that." And so it was. We were wed a year later on that same Autumn day down by the creek where we first met. Of course the irony is not lost on the locals who still giggle about Mrs Ida Downes, winner of best bedspreads, five years running.

So, my concerns regarding changes and new neighbours have been unfounded. Curly and Sunshine and their three kids and seven goats and 4 horses and 2 donkeys and 3 dogs, have all settled in nicely. They are the only locals who can begin to rival my own vegetable garden. They also choose to use no chemicals. They call it organics/permaculture. Like its a new thing. I'm a fourth generation organic/permaculture gardener. We can see we have a lot in common already. My new neighbours and I swap ideas and excess produce. The kids have named me 'the grand daddy' of vege gardening. Which I love.

First thing Curly and Sunshine and the kids did was clean up ol' GG's orchard. Poor old GG didn't care much for fruit and let it go wild. It was GG's mum who tended the orchid. She will be doing cartwheels of joy wherever she may be at the site of this old Grove shown new love.

APPLY TO PICK YOUR COMMUNITY PROJECT

Victorian residents aged 16 and over will be able to submit their idea for consideration under the *Pick My Project* program backed by \$30 million from the *Victorian Budg*et 2018/19. Any idea that helps build a stronger community, and has the backing of a local organisation, community group, school, local council, or other eligible group to help is possible.

Ideas could include anything from sporting and recreation infrastructure, community arts projects, improvements to community facilities or the local environment. Projects need to be feasible & have land-owner consent, but without restrictive guidelines many local local priorities that fall-between the cracks of other grant programs will be eligible .

Communities then get to vote for the projects they think are most important, giving residents the first and final say on the best way to improve their area. Projects between \$20,000 and \$200,000 considered. Starts May, winners Sept 18. To register pickmyproject.vic.gov.au

Curly even tells me that writing is an art form and that I am a part of the art community because I love to scratch out a few verses and tell a yarn or two. I don't know about that. But I will keep an open mind. He is even trying to educate me on using a computer. Imagine at my age. Learning about things like Bogie-tree. He says local people talk on it. So, look out when I get my old head around that parcel of pie. People using trees to communicate with each other. Sounds like the Pagans my Grand daddy talked about from the old country. Little people and fairies and spirits of trees and rocks and creeks talking and sharing their knowledge. Maybe, just maybe, people are starting to wake up to what us old folk always have understood about the spirit of nature.

Thanks for reading this 'arty piece' and a good day to you all in this beautiful area we call Strathbogie.



PINING FOR THE STRATHBOGIE FOREST OF 50 YEARS AGO: continued from Page 7 Fifty years later this fabric has been decimated, I have no doubt the deforestation by the government played a major role in this demise. The shadow of the pine plantations was not then apparent in Warrenbayne from our perspective. Gradually the impact began to shadow our lives. Tony travelled through the horror of clear-felling of more and more forest from Warrenbayne to Boho South.

The burning of all this beautiful forest was the next stage in the devastation. Smoke cast a pall over the valley for weeks on end and the wildlife that survived in small pockets was also destroyed. Mysterious light planes would appear spraying golden mists into the valley. The official version that this was just fertilizer spray did not ring true even then. This spraying continued until 1990. The horrific reality was not admitted openly until 1990 in the State Pine Impact Study.

Tony developed serious rashes and growths in his eyes which required surgery. Our second daughter was born in 1975 and it became quickly apparent that her health was an issue though full diagnosis took another twelve years. A Community meeting with the Forest Department was held in the Warrenbayne Hall in the mid-1970s and it was here that I first questioned the health impacts as many children were developing asthma and other symptoms. Also alarming was the high rate of miscarriages (four deaths out of five pregnancies) including our third child.

The pattern of local ill health emerged slowly, giving cause for questions to doctors and the Department of Forests and Lands. Cancers and other serious health issues particularly developed in adults in close proximity to the plantations. Concerns were fobbed off. However, both Dr King and Dr Patience then began privately expressing concerns for the growing issues and infertility rates.

Tony's health issues increased and our Joscelyn's health required operations and constant doctor's visits. Epilepsy was a concern in the young population. Our son Michael at 6 months developed infantile epilepsy and had to be constantly monitored over the next few years. Again my concerns were fobbed off until eventually in 1990, Joscelyn was diagnosed by Dr Bast with a rare (one in four million) chromosomal mutation. This required lifesaving surgery as her ovaries were developing fatal cancerous cells. She had required surgery for bone cancer when she was nine. Our family's health issues were mirrored in the families around us.

Evidence of ill health and early death in the valley accumulated, especially in the men that held the targets for the spray planes. It was finally when my best friends, Wally and Barb Schaefer, lost their beautiful daughter Kathy to cancer at 24, after having rung the Department warning them that spray from the plane overhead was hitting their roof, did the reality hit me like a bolt of lightning. The rumoured spray was 24d and 24t in diesel (known as Agent Orange) - confirmed in 1990. Tordon was also used later known as Agent White. The release of the State Pine Impact Study In 1990 confirmed the community's worst fears. Dioxin, a mutagenic carcinogenic and tetragenic contaminant was an issue that was to rear its ugly head in Warrenbayne and other districts surrounding the Strathbogie ranges for decades. This was the same issue in all areas of heavy woody weedicide spraying all over Australia as finally exposed in "The Chemical Time Bomb", 4 Corners documentary from 2013. In the case of the Strathbogies, the "weed threat" was the wattle and eucalypts that would have deprived the pine of its growth??

Slowly, community action and concern began to swell as the media helped to confirm our fears. At least one third of our school pupils of the spray era developed health issues like cancer or infertility or other Hazardous Chemical linked conditions. The cover up over this issue slowly emerged, devastating and shattering trust. Divisions occurred in the communities as Government employees and doctors were discouraged from revealing the facts. We knew that they knew the truth, but were openly discouraged from being part of an Australia wide campaign to stop aerial spraying of hazardous chemicals. While at home, my teenage daughter questioned why I was attracted to "deaths and funerals".

Politicians like Joan Kirner and Tony Windsor were ignored. Dr Guy and Wangaratta's Shirley Barber, with the backing of the Uniting Church, gradually became spokesperson for community concerns. Friends of the Earth did comprehensive reports into the Issue and gradually the Australia wide effects became more public with Internet usage. Julian Cribs' book the Poisoned Planet is a must read for those with similar understandings. Most recently Barnaby Joyce's actions in removing the "red and green tape" around hazardous chemical importation and decimating the APVMA make community action even more urgent. One must question the lobbying power of the chemical companies now known as Croplife? Where is their moral compass? How many people read the warnings on the labels and the disclaimer "use at own risk"! 'Getting a contractor to spray for you doesn't solve the problem. Chemical contamination ranks right up with climate change as a threat to humanity.

Cancer rates in Australia rank in the highest in the world according to the World Health Organisation We are obviously considered collateral damage to the economical rationalist insanity. It is only now I have true empathy with people of the First Nations and feel betrayed as they did. Arsenic in flour was used to eradicate their population. Now we are mindlessly spraying our own food with known carcinogens. The cost of organic food is often prohibitive for most families

The momentum for a Royal Commission has started in these ranges and the Petition to Government will be available for signing in early May. I BESEECH you all to consider signing this as to continue to devastate our Precious Water Catchments, to spray 1080 on our wildlife and pollute our food chain is insanity.
