



New Bushfire Place of Last Resort for Euroa

Strathbogie Shire Council has endorsed Kirkland Avenue, between Clifton Street and Bury Street, as the Bushfire Place of Last Resort (Bushfire Neighbourhood Safer Place) for Euroa. The need for a new Bushfire Place of Last Resort came after the Euroa Service Centre was decommissioned as the designated location earlier this year. The Kirkland Avenue location was endorsed by Council at the recent Ordinary Meeting in Strathbogie.

The following locations in the Strathbogie Shire are also Bushfire Places of Last Resort:

- Avenel Recreation Reserve Pavilion, bounded by Swamp Road, Anderson Street and Watson Street
- Longwood Recreation Reserve Pavilion, Down Street
- Mangalore Airport Main Building, 331 Aerodrome Road
- Nagambie Lakes Regatta Centre, 66 Loddings Lane
- Ruffy Recreation Reserve Oval, Noye Lane
- Strathbogie Golf Club House, Armstrong Avenue
- Violet Town Recreation Reserve Pavilion, Tulip Street

Strathbogie Shire Mayor Amanda McClaren said "We want to remind our communities that Bushfire Places of Last Resort are places you can go when all other fire plans have failed; they are not an alternative to your fire plan." Cr McClaren explained. "If you haven't already, please review and update your fire plan and prepare your property for the fire season."

The CFA provides the following advice regarding Bushfire Places of Last Resort: Locations may provide some protection from direct flame and heat from a fire, but they do not guarantee safety. They are not an alternative to planning to leave early or to stay and defend your property; they are a place of last resort if all other fire plans have failed. They are not to be confused with Community Fire Refuges, Relief Centres, Recovery Centres or Assembly Areas, each of which have a different and specific purpose. They are not a place to shelter from other types of emergencies such as flood or severe weather.



Hello Again,

As I write this article the campaign for the Victorian state election is about to end. Over the past few weeks we have seen candidates for the seat of Euroa make announcements about funding for various initiatives. So, I thought I would give my observations and thoughts on the relationship between the state government and the shire.



While local government is answerable to the residents through democratic elections, the statutory responsibility rests with the state government. How could the state improve local government?

The services that local governments provide to their communities are defined by the state, but councils are somewhat autonomous in how they are delivered. This theoretically gives the community the say on the services they receive e.g. how they want their waste collected, the standard of road maintenance, the importance of recreation facilities, what the local area looks like through planning controls, etc. But to do these things better, the following could happen:

Administration

I think the focus of councils should be direct service delivery. There are 79 councils in Victoria and they operate as autonomous business units. This means they develop and run their own business systems. For a small shire like Strathbogie, this need to run our own information systems, payroll systems, accounting systems, project management systems, etc. not only requires significant staffing, but also represents a sizeable spend from a limited budget. In this age of 'cloud' computing, why doesn't the state provide a standard administrative system to all councils? It would save millions of dollars and free staff to provide direct services. Every VicRoads office doesn't have a unique system, so why do councils?

Structural Reform

The strength of councils should be their proximity (and therefore response) to the community. I think reform is needed to ensure that councillors reflect the community. At Strathbogie Shire it is difficult for people in full-time employment or family carers to be a Councillor. Changing this is complex and is not as simple as increasing the proportion of work undertaken outside of normal working hours (which has an impact on council staff). I do think that the state government does need to compare the profile of councillors to their communities and find ways of increasing representation. Two suggestions would be term limits (a Councillor shouldn't stand for more than more than two consecutive terms to encourage 'new blood') and looking at ways to ensure Councillors have reward for effort e.g. respect for diversity, ensuring all points of view are considered and seeing that the needs of constituents are attended to.

Funding

The magic pudding. During the state election campaign funding promises for local initiatives are made. While many, the majority of these are initiatives identified by local authorities, the announcements do not necessarily reflect the priority of need. Political considerations can prevail. How is the assessment made that the new recreation reserve in shire X is more important than the bridge in shire Y? In the Strathbogie Shire, residents directly contribute two thirds of the shire's income and the state/federal government provides the balance through grants. The largest grant is the Financial Assistance Grant. This was established in the 1970's to enable local authorities to provide basic levels of service. While it has a needs based component, it is largely driven by population. This means that metropolitan councils (with a far greater capacity to raise revenue through charges e.g. parking) take a large share of this 'needs' driven funding. A report this year in the Victorian parliament highlighted the sustainability challenges of councils like Strathbogie with large infrastructure networks (roads) supported by small populations. Financial reform is needed to ensure that 'need' is the determining factor for funding, not political consideration.



The Public Record Office, Victoria is now accepting applications. Previous years have seen historical societies, museums and galleries, local sports clubs, and even schools funded for projects that capture and preserve history - for instance local exhibitions, websites, walking tours, etc.

Who can apply?

Your organisation will need to meet the following criteria.


- a) Based in Victoria
- b) Not-for-profit In addition your organisation will also need to be:
- c) Registered with the Office of Consumer Affairs Victoria as either an Incorporated body or Association, Co-operative, OR be auspiced by a group with this status and
- d) Have an Australian Business Number (ABN) OR be auspiced by a group with an ABN (e.g. Council, Library etc.)

Resilient Sustainable Agriculture Lime/Acid Soil Trials Field Day



Despite the inclement weather, there was an excellent turnout for Landcare's Field Day at David Hamilton's Carpenter Lane Pasture Trial Site.

Attendees were introduced to the various acid tolerant pasture species planted and lime preparations applied

across the paddock.

More recently, pelletised lime was drilled with two species of pasture to create a



micro environment around the plants prior to germination.

Germination, persistence and productivity are being examined.

David Hamilton explained the site set up and progress. Agriculture Victoria Land Management Officer Greg Bekker discussed measuring techniques and Alistair Tame demonstrated the new soil moisture probe and weather station.
