Permanent Protection of the Strathbogie Forest

February 27, 2014 - seems like a long time ago. On that day, people from near and far filled the Strathbogie Hall out of concern for the increase in logging that Victorests had planned for the Strathbogie



Forest. In the almost six years since that first public meeting, we've learnt much about the forest and just how special and valuable it is – for nature, for stream-flow, for carbon storage, for recreation, for particular threatened species and for climate change resilience. We've also learnt how the previous (and proposed) logging was not saw-log driven and provided virtually no economic benefit for the local economy, as well as the untapped economic opportunity the forest offers.

Today, six years later, the Victorian Government has announced the

immediate protection of the Strathbogie Forest, including a cessation of logging in the forest. The management and logging of the 8000+ ha of pine plantations adjacent to the forest will of course continue.

In the last 150 years 75% of all the forest and woodland that once clothed the Strathbogie Ranges, about 240,000 ha, from Warrenbayne to Seymour, from Euroa to Yea, has been lost – cleared mainly for farming. That farmland is now an important regional resource. In the same way, the 24,000 ha Strathbogie Forest, the largest intact bit of bush left in the entire ranges, is also an important regional resource.

The economic opportunity that a protected Strathbogie Forest offers the region is significant and only limited by our imaginations. Our forest may be small, but it is accessible and diverse with some stunning scenery and hidden gems. As important as increased visitor usage will be for the local economy, it has to be managed carefully so that the very gems we want to share with visitors are not degraded in the process. Planning is all-important.

The forest is virtually the last refuge for a host of forest-dependent plants and animals that have disappeared from elsewhere across these ranges. For two species, the threatened Powerful Owl and the Greater Glider, the Strathbogie Forest is the last stronghold in the region and the forest supports one of the healthiest Greater Glider populations in all Victoria – a major reason the forest is being protected.

In the short-term little will change, other than a halt to logging. Visitor usage - camping, regulated



firewood collecting, bushwalking, hunting etc-will all still continue. The exciting part is developing the vision that strikes the right balance between visitor usage and recreation, on the one hand, and managing the forest for it's natural values.

Key partners on this journey are the Traditional Owners, whose ancestors lived and journeyed in this country for tens of thousands of years. Evidence of their occupation is spread far and wide across the Strathbogie Tableland and protection of the forest offers a great opportunity for reengagement, including cultural and economic empowerment. The Taungurung Land & Waters Council is already an important part of the conversation.

I imagine a forest with facilities for family picnics and community camp-outs. Where self-guided car tours enable the discovery of hidden beauty and open vistas.



A Bit of Rain at the Start of Summer means just a bit more time to get your Property Fire Ready

While sitting down in the rain on the first day of summer, it is easy to forget that we have had one of the earliest starts to the fire season for a long time. Remember we have gone through our first catastrophic day since Black Saturday.

If you have not cleaned up, this rain interlude will give you the opportunity. The only hope any person has against fire, on a day of 40 degrees and 80km/h winds, is preparation. The CFA can attempt to help if you have done your bit cleaning up. However, no tanker crew will risk their crew to save any house, especially if no preparation work has been undertaken.

So, now is the time to ensure your grass is short and kept green. Your gutters are clear of debris. The undergrowth is pruned back away from your home. Also your water pumps may not have been used for 12 months, time to test while we have the opportunity.

And remember access. All fire trucks require an opening of 3 meters wide and 3.1 meters high. This is often the first part of your property the incoming tankers look at, and use this to rapidly assess your preparation.

Now, here is another thing you can do for your local fire brigade. Currently there is a petition to the Victorian Parliament regarding our new fire station. If every local could please sign it (and any other citizen of the state of Victoria) the Strathbogie fire brigade would be most appreciative. You can sign it at the Strathbogie Store.

Hello Everyone,

The Strathbogie Shire Council has recently taken two decisions that are very relevant to residents of the Strathbogie Tableland. I would like to outline these decisions.

First, on 19 November, the Shire appointed Ms Julie Salomon as Chief Executive Officer. Julie joins us from Monash City Council where she held the role of Director Community Development and Services. Prior to her role with Monash City Council Julie was with Greater Shepparton City Council as Director Communities and Acting Chief Executive Officer.

Julie will commence employment on 13 January, 2020, and has joined the Shire on a 3-year contract. She will be relocating from Melbourne to the region. I welcome Julie to the Shire.

During the recruitment process I found her to have excellent strategic thinking, communication and relationship building skills. Julie is an extremely hard working and energetic individual who, I think, will be able to motivate and lead the staff at the Shire.

The second decision I wish to cover is the new waste Kerbside Collection Services Policy. A recent study found that the Strathbogie Shire was the second most successful local authority in Victoria for diversion of household waste away from landfill dumping. This is a credit to the good system in place, but importantly the care that residents are taking to put their rubbish correctly into the green organics bin, the yellow recycling bin and only what is left into the red landfill waste bin.

The new kerbside policy increases equity for all residents across the Shire by removing exemptions and exclusions, so that all households (that can geographically receive a service) are treated equally.

In the case of the Strathbogie Tableland, the commitment is to increase the kerbside collection service so that the current communal collection point at the Recreation Ground is no longer required. An initial implementation date of 1 July 2020 for the change in Strathbogie has been identified. Council staff will undertake an engagement process with affected households prior to implementation.

Town Signage

Several designs for township entrance signs have been selected for the community to vote on. The designs will be displayed on the noticeboard in Main Street and voting slips will be available in the store. Voting will close on Friday 13th December.

Diesel Fuel

The site has been prepared and it is expected that the fuel cell will be delivered by early December and should be fully operational by Christmas which, apart from servicing the community, will be of significant benefit to the CFA during the fire season. Refuelling Solutions (RFS) will hold an information session for the community.

Spring Creek Picnic Shelter

During the development of Council's current budget, STAG requested that a slip lane be created to provide access to the Picnic Shelter at Spring Creek. Both STAG and the CFA have written to Council expressing their concern at the decision not to create a slip lane, but to close the top entrance. Vehicles approaching from the town would need to either cross double lines or continue to Magiltan Drive to do a u-turn. Also, in the event of a major fire, this area would be used to fill CFA trucks – numerous trucks waiting to fill could block the main Euroa -Strathbogie Road.

Take action now to protect against fruit fly

Home gardeners are encouraged to act now so future crops in their garden or yard, and commercial crops are safe from fruit flies. Queensland Fruit Fly (QFF) populations are currently being trapped and recorded in urban areas. Home gardeners should take some simple steps to help protect against the spread of the pest.

Reoccurring trouble spots

If you or your neighbours had fruit fly problems in your garden last year that were not controlled, you are likely to have them again this season.

Monitor for fruit fly

You can monitor for the presence of QFF using traps and eyesight. Most traps catch male QFF, however some will catch females. You can also monitor by checking ripening fruit for fruit fly sting marks. Don't forget to check and monitor your front yard too if it contains fruiting plants.

Keep an eye out for fruiting plants near your house, on roadsides, channel banks, Council and Crown land, untended properties and business sites. You may have to talk with your Council or your local Fruit Fly Coordinator to let them know about host plants.

Remove ripening fruit

Simply put - if fruit flies do not have fruit to lay into, they will die out eventually. After removal, fruit must be handled and destroyed properly so that fly larvae can't escape into the soil. Compost heaps are not a good place to destroy fruit as conditions on and around them are suitable for QFF survival.

Tree removal

If you have a fruit tree you are unable to manage or no longer want, contact your participating Council for more information about the free Fruit Tree Removal Program.

Baiting

Baits attract and kill fruit flies with food-based attractants and toxicants. There are several commercial products available for this strategy. Baiting works best in the home garden if it is practiced by all neighbours and is most effective when applied weekly (and more often if it rains).

Netting

Netting is a highly effective fruit fly control strategy for the home garden if you want to keep your fruit and fruit fly susceptible vegetables (such as tomatoes, chillies, eggplants, capsicum, rockmelons, honeydews). Because many fruiting plants need bees, moths or wind to pollinate them to allow fruit to set, netting should be applied after fruit set. There are different types and sizes of fruit fly netting.

Restricted use of pesticides

There are very few pesticides with Federal Government approval for use in home gardens and those that are approved are difficult to obtain. Your garden produce or hardware store can provide further advice about the various products to help control and manage fruit fly.


Mystery Solved



∑"Summertime and the living is easy."

That's how the song goes, but along with the warmer weather come a number of unwanted pests in our gardens and homes.

One pest that is particularly annoying are earwigs, especially when they arrive in their thousands / millions. It is so sad to see roses and other flowers attacked by these greedy monsters along with anything in the vegetable garden.

One way to reduce their numbers, without resorting to insecticide, is to put folded newspaper or a cardboard box in the garden at night and burn in a safe place in the morning - along with all the earwigs.

Another extremely unwanted pest are the flies, both large and small. Here are a few natural suggestions to try and keep them away from the kitchen.

Try placing a pot of basil, fennel or mint near the kitchen door of your house.

Bay leaves placed on a branch in your pantry will discourage flies and last more than a year. You can also remove a leaf or two when needed for cooking.

Mice also dislike mint, so try and keep a fresh sprig of it near a mouse hole. Mint leaves, cayenne pepper and cotton wool soaked in peppermint oil will work even better.

Mint also is meant to discourage that other pest that comes in their thousands - mosquitoes. Keep a pot of it near places they frequent. Also, make sure that there are no containers of water lying around the garden in which they can breed.

When out and about, make sure you wear some insect repellent to have an itch free evening. Remember some people are allergic to spray repellents, so make sure the spray only goes on you and not on those around you.

As always, try Polly's Hints at your own risk. Polly encourages trying out solutions new and old, but also encourages doing so with care.

What would Christmas be without Mum's Christmas Cake?

Pat Cherry submitted this recipe to Peranbin Primary College's <u>Delish</u>, <u>Our Family Favourites</u> in 2012.

She said, "This is the cake that my mother would make for us every year at Christmas time. I have carried on the tradition, and now I make it for my family."

Maybe you would like to try it for your family too!

1 cup butter

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup white sugar

4 eggs

500g raisins

500g sultanas

125g glazed cherries

250g mixed peel chopped

1/2 cup pineapple

1/4 cup blanched almonds chopped

4tbs either whisky, sherry or brandy

1 cup plain flour

1 tspn cinnamon

1 tspn nutmeg

To prepare the fruits and nuts combine and mix well. Pour over the spirits, cover and stand overnight.

Preheat oven to 150 degrees.

Cream the butter and the sugar, add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition

Add the sifted flour and spices alternately with the soaked fruit into the creamed butter and sugar

Pour into a paper lined greased tin

Bake in a slow oven for approximately 3.5 hours
