

Beautiful Bogie trees - pick for August 2021

This long-leaved box (*Eucalyptus goniocalyx*) at Kelvin View, is on the property belonging to Eddie and Dorothy Spain. Growing on the rhyolite/rhyodacite of the Violet Town Volcanics, it was a mature tree with a wide canopy in the 1940s, so it must be well in excess of 100 years old. The Spain's have made the paddock surrounding this tree available for revegetation as part of a rocky outcrop restoration project. At the start of the project, it was one of only two mature trees remaining in that paddock. Numerous trees from the first planting, some years ago, are now well established. More trees, purchased with money raised by Bogart at the Bogie pizza nights, were planted a few weeks back. Wind and storm exposure are a threat to old trees such as this, but revegetation surrounding such trees can mitigate this risk.

I know that many of you go for walks around the Strathbogies, and must be seeing some wonderful native trees, so please contribute a photo of one of your favourites for Tableland Talk. Please send the photo, and a short paragraph to indicate its locality etc., to me. Thanks!



The Name Game: Rhino-this and Rhina-that



If I were to tell you of the existence of a species whose scientific name is *Rhinacanthus nasutus*, what kind of creature would you guess it to be? If you had even a sketchy knowledge of Greek and Latin roots, I reckon your thinking might go like this: *rhinos* (Greek) nose; *akantha* (Greek) spine or prickle; *nasutus* (Latin) with a long nose. Has to be a rhinoceros, for sure ... but it isn't. It's a tropical Asian plant used in a variety of medicinal applications, and its common name is Snake Jasmine.

What, then, is the generic name (genus) of the rhinoceros – is it (as it ought to be) just plain *Rhinoceros*? Well it is and it isn't: it depends on which kind of rhinoceros you have in mind. Africa is home to two species of rhino, Asia to three. The survival of all five

is under threat, at levels ranging from serious to critical.

Two species, the Indian (sometimes called Greater One-horned) and the Javan Rhinoceros do indeed share the genus name *Rhinoceros (Greek,* nose horn). The Javan species is *Rhinoceros sondaicus*, referring to Sunda, the inclusive name for the parts of south-east Asia where the species is to be found. Each of the other three species is in a separate genus, and their horns are the feature chosen by nearly every describer to provide the basis of their names, using a variety of combinations of the Greek and Latin words for **nose** (Greek *rhinos*) and **horn** or **horned** (Greek *keras, keratos*; Latin *cornu, cornutus).*

So the Indian Rhinoceros is *Rhinoceros unicornus* (nose horn, one-horned); the African White or Squarelipped Rhinoceros is *Ceratotherium simum* (horned beast, snub-nosed). Both the Sumatran and the African Black Rhinoceros have two horns, and their names celebrate the fact: the Sumatran species is *Dicerorhinus sumatrensis* (two-horned nose from Sumatra). The name of the African Black Rhinoceros ensures that you won't forget how many horns it has: *Diceros bicornus* (Greek, two-horn; Latin, twohorn). A parallel with the Northern Hemispere Brown Bear, *Ursus arctos* (Latin *ursus*, bear; Greek *arktos*, bear).

One question remains: Why does Snake Jasmine have such an animally sort of name? I haven't got that one figured out yet. Any botanists out there?

Chocolate Rough Slice

From the Jacka Family, an old favourite recipe handed down from their Grandmother. Great for catering occasions as well.

Ingredients:

125g butter

1/2 cup sugar

- 1 desert spoon Golden Syrup
- 1 cup SR flour
- 1 cup coconut

Topping:

1/2 tin condensed milk50g butter

- 1 cup icing sugar
- 1 cup coconut

2 tbsn cocoa

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180 degrees. Cream butter and sugar, beat in Golden Syrup. Add sifted flour, fold in coconut. Bake for 30 minutes.

Topping: combine milk and butter in a saucepan and stir over heat until melted. Remove from heat and blend in icing sugar, cocoa and coconut. Spread over the slice while still hot.



Walk of the Month Longwood Heritage Walk

90 minutes 3.6km Easy





Take a walk along the wide streets of Longwood, a classic Central Victorian town. Historic sites, rural lifestyle and evident community pride will keep you engaged.

As for so many Victorian towns, traffic to Victorian goldfields saw the original Longwood settlement securely established. However, arrival of the railway in 1872 moved the town's centre of activity. It resulted in Old Longwood's eventual depopulation. The site of today's main township is New Longwood, surveyed in 1885 to make the most of the railway line.



The town has interesting stories to tell. Bushrangers and ne'er-do-wells roved local hills and plains, including the notorious Kelly Gang. Drought and fire have taken their toll. New technologies such as rail and the motor car have heavily influenced residents' comings and goings.

There were many enterprises supported by the town. At various times there have been several hotels, a telegraph repeater station, a tolling station, a railway station, a bank, Post Office, a coach builder and blacksmith, sale yards, 7 saw mills, grocery stores, butchers, a horse racing track and numerous social and sporting clubs.

Today, it is hard to believe that at the turn of the 19th / 20th century this was dairy as well as sheep country. By the 1920s, land was five pounds per acre. One acre was said to support a ewe and a lamb. The arrival of

superphosphate increased stock holdings significantly. Resident Brian Morrison broke the world shearing record by shearing 410 Merinos in 7 hours and 48 minutes. With wife Judy, their next big accomplishment was "Morrisons", a company that became a household name across the nation for quality rural apparel.

Few localities can claim multiple heroes awarded the Victoria Cross for their bravery. Three local soldiers have been memorialised here and in grand style at the VC Memorial in nearby Euroa. Major Leslie Maygar in the Boer War, Captain Fred Tubb and Corporal Alexander Burton at Gallipoli in WWI.

The ever busier modern world, with its urban focus and city to city fast cars whizzing past on the freeway by pass, have seen quieter times come to Longwood. However, this is probably another good reason for you to take some time out here.
