


### Airborne gravity survey in 2022 includes Strathbogie Ranges

Airborne gravity data is being collected over large regions of Victoria including the central coast, Melbourne, the Australian Alps and eastern Victoria (see Figure 1). The surveys require flights over diverse land types including urban and rural areas, mountainous and coastal terrain and national and state parks and reserves. There is no ground disturbance, and stakeholders and the general public are being advised of the surveys before they occur in specific areas.

The objective is to collect consistent and evenly distributed gravity measurements. The new survey data will significantly improve Victoria's gravity model and the accuracy of real-world heights from GPS (global positioning systems). The data will also be used by geoscientists to further their understanding of southeast Australia's geological architecture and how it has evolved over time. The data and gravity model will improve height determination from GPS positioning to an accuracy of a few centimetres. The changes will support productive and effective land management and technological innovation and meet community expectations of reliable GPS positioning in Victoria.

The new data will advance the geoscience that assists the Victorian Government to manage its earth resources, infrastructure, and natural hazards. It will also assist the State's resources sector, which contributes to regional jobs and economic growth.

My additional comments: The survey will include the whole extent of the Strathbogie granite including to just northwest of the Hume freeway. We are expecting the gravity data will be valuable within the Strathbogie Granite Project to help resolve some longer-term geological issues, and eventually the results can be shared with the public through community lectures, field trips and short articles. I am not involved in the survey itself but might be able to explain more details if that would be helpful. The above is a precis of information received from the Victorian Government.

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### Walk of the Month Town and Country Walk - Ruffy



Start: corner of Nolans and Longwood Ruffy Rd., Ruffy Distance 4.2km Difficulty easy This is an attractive family farmland walk or romantic ramble. The loop adopts a road reserve of open woodland as a corridor to connect both sides of Ruffy Township.

With a population of only 112, Ruffy might sound like a small place. This is not the case. Sitting atop the south western granite mass of the Strathbogie Tablelands, it is a big place. The landscapes are grand, the rocky outcrops extensive and the waterways beautiful.

Park anywhere in Ruffy's main thoroughfare, Nolans Rd. Outside the Ruffy Produce Store (open for bookings only), the Ruffy Hall or Community Centre are all convenient. The Community Centre used to be the Primary School (1886 – 2005) and still has the advantage of a playground out back for kids to enjoy. Many students rode horses to school and tethered them at the sale yards that were opposite. Keep your eyes open within the Township for information signs and plaques honouring local residents.

As you walk through town, a challenge is to spot the one standing remnant of the Ruffy Hotel (next to the Hall). Built in 1888 and burnt in 1963, in its time the Hotel served as everything from accommodation and general store to drinking establishment and Post Office. Just what do you think this small concrete wall might have been for? Take your time to inspect the town along the way. It is endearing and inviting, with a charming rural outlook in every direction.

Once you leave the township the walk takes you onto sweeping vistas of the undulating Ruffy Tableland countryside. The walk closes a loop of 3 roads. The active public roads, Longwood – Ruffy Rd and Nolans Rd, may not carry much traffic, but there will be vehicles from time to time. Be mindful and keep to the shoulder on the right.

The Eddy Lane turnoff is marked by a sign post. However, there is no longer a sign. The Lane itself is not used as such, so look for the opening into the beginnings of a wooded corridor between grassy grazing properties.

This is an opportunity for a close encounter farmland walk, without worrying about entering private land holdings. With kookaburras guiding the way, contented sheep to either side and bucolic views, it is a very pleasant way to spend a couple of hours. The track is grassy, dry most of the time and lined with beautiful eucalypt forest. Along the way there is a small rise of granite boulders at the track zenith that makes for an agreeable picnic spot. Bird watching, photography, painting, rest and respite are suitable ways to enjoy this space.

Please make sure you close off any temporary fencing. Carry water and something to eat, be sun smart, wear closed shoes and a hat.

### Beautiful Bogie Trees April 2022 – red box

This grand old red box, *Eucalyptus polyanthemos*, is standing roadside on Harry's Creek Road, approximately 6.5 km up towards Marraweeny from the bridge over the Hume Highway. Every time we drive to Violet Town this tree catches my eye, even though there are quite a number of lovely old eucalypts, of various species, along this stretch of road. Initially I was not sure about my identification because I am not accustomed to seeing red box of such a large size, plus this particular tree has not set buds and fruit for a while, so I struggled to find any on the ground (my normal approach if I am not sure about the species). I did find some on my next visit! There are many red boxes, set in lovely grassy woodland, on the unsealed road down to Merton – for me they are such a lovely part of that drive. This species occurs in a band on the slopes and tablelands of NSW and down into Victoria, extending west to around Bendigo, and is fairly drought tolerant. It generally grows to about 20m and often on shallow soil. The smaller stems carrying the leaves are often a dark reddish-brown, which contrasts beautifully with the greenish-grey foliage.



### Geology of the Swanpool district and Strathbogie Ranges

A public lecture and discussion led by Neil Phillips

Universities of Melbourne and Stellenbosch RSA



The Strathbogie granite fills the large area between the Hume freeway, Goulburn Valley highway and Midland highway. This triangle between Benalla, Seymour and Mansfield is an iconic landscape of boulders, slabs, cliffs, gorges and numerous waterfalls carved into the granite. The same granite extends east to the Samaria plateau placing Swanpool and Lima in more fertile gaps where the granite has been eroded by the ancestral Goulburn River and now the Broken River.

#### THE STRATHBOGIE GRANITE PROJECT

is a long-term collaboration amongst researchers led by John Clemens and Neil Phillips involving particularly the University of Melbourne, and Stellenbosch University in South Africa. John has a global granite perspective and leads the laboratory work; Neil leads the field work covering much of the ground from Tallarook to Mt Samaria. This field work has been supported through the generous co-operation of many hundred landowners who have provided land access, and many others who have shared their knowledge during the community walks on the Tallarook, Highlands and Seven Creeks plateaus. Community presentations such as this one at Swanpool are opportunities to provide feedback on the research findings. An aim of the project has been to develop the geological platform to assist in understanding the whole natural environment including groundwaters, soils, vegetation, agriculture and geomorphic landforms.

The Strathbogie Granite is recognised globally amongst granite experts for its widespread mineral (cordierite) and for the exceptional period of violence when it formed 370 million years ago. The research continues to pose challenging questions, and we might be able to answer some of these such as why the Broken River valley is so broad, and what role the granite has played in the quarry at Lima South adjacent to the granite. There are also puzzles such as why gold is found adjacent to the granite but not in it, and how quartz crystals form.

The evening will include a small display of some typical rocks, and a presentation by Neil Phillips followed by general discussions.

## **Recipe of the Month** Melanzane Alla

Parmigiana, an old and delicious family favourite from the Valmorbida Family and a great way to use some of those eggplants and tomatoes ready to harvest right now! (Eggplant Parmigiana) Serves 6

#### Ingredients

4 medium eggplants Olive oil Sugo di Pomodoro (tomato sauce) 1 onion finely chopped 1 garlic clove chopped 700g tomato puree (passata sauce) Salt and pepper Fresh basil chopped 1/3 cup Fresh parsley chopped 1/3 cup Fresh oregano chopped 1/3 cup Combine herbs 500g Mozzarella, sliced or shredded 100g Parmesan grated

#### Method

Preheat ove 180 degrees Slice unpeeled eggplant no greater than 1cm thick Brush slices with olive oil and grill untder an overhead griller or on a chargrill pan for 3-5minutes each side

Sugo di Pomodoro (sauce)

Prepare well ahead Heat a little olive oil

What about learning the latest tech to monitor your soil moisture from home? Well then, have you ever thought it would be good to do a Whole Farm Planning course? Or best of all,

using the subsidies for weed spraying and rabbit control, and the free Super Spreader and Indian Myna traps! Not to mention checking out a good old sausage sizzle at a field day every now and then.

Membership to the Strathbogie Tableland Landcare Group is only \$5 annually per person or family until June. But due to increased insurance fees we have to raise this to \$10 from July, and we don't want the committee

Add finely chopped onion and garlic and fry until soft

Add tomato puree and bring to boil, cook until lightly thickened

Season to taste and add half a cup of chopped herbs

To assemble smear the bottom of a baking dish with sugo

Layer the eggplant slices Dot with Mozzarella Sprinkle with Parmesan and herbs and repeat Finish with sugo topped with cheese Sprinkle with a little water Bake 20-25 minutes until the top is golden Note: peak season for eggplants of November to March. Always choose eggplants that are smooth, shiny and heavy for their size. If you find, having cut the eggplant, that the seeds are very hard and too pronounced, the eggplant is over mature. The seeds will be hard and taste unpleasant. Discard these eggplants.

# Peranbin Primary College Strathbogie Campus

Clean Up Australia Day this year was down at the creek. We also had Grace from the Strathbogie Shire Council come in and talk to us about different types of rubbish and the hazards these pose. Grace helped us sort through the items we collected and identify which items go in which bins. It was a really useful exercise for all involved and we found out some interesting things about waste management in our Shire. For example; that even broken glass can be recycled in our Shire because it is re-used for road base! As well as the fact that aluminium cans can be recycled an infinite amount of times!



We went for a walk down by the creek before Grace arrived to collect some rubbish and also had a mini Bogie Backyard session whereby the students learnt about ephemeral (seasonal) waterways and about native flowers and how they attract native birds and bees. We will be building on these skills further as the weeks go on and the students will be working further on their identification skills and taking polaroid pictures of animals and plants to annotate when they get back to class.
