Australia Day organising committee to engage with council to ensure funding confusion avoided next year. Suggestion from organising committee to introduce awards at next years event – this decision will sit outside of STAG's remit. Process for approval of expenditure reinforced.

Strathbogie Action Plan

Additional time to be allocated at next meeting to run through previous action plan, as well as those of other towns within the shire, to help shape revised plan.

Community event to celebrate re-opening of Rec Centre

Provide support to Rec Centre committee as required should there be an event planned.

Rec Centre pump

Seek funding from council to install adequate multi-purpose quick fill pump.

Communications Subcommittee

Ongoing investigation re exposure of Subcommittee members to liability. Further investigation taking place about the nature of existing liability insurance cover.

Strathbogie township streetscape

No further word from council subsequent to being notified that new design consultants have been appointed. Some recommendations made about what sort of planting may be appropriate.

Cup weekend community event

Seeking to support Lisa Duggan in her organisation of the event. Open invitation to Lisa to attend a STAG meeting to discuss how the committee can assist. Council's event risk management framework is a good point of reference in the planning process.

Council risk management session

Beautiful Bogie Trees: Manna Gum, April 2023

To me, the Manna Gum (Eucalvptus viminalis), with its smooth white bark and slender drooping leaves is one of the more elegant eucalypts you will encounter across the Strathbogie Ranges. This species is widespread in eastern and southern Victoria, Tasmania and eastern NSW, with a limited distribution in SA. It grows mostly on moister well drained soils. Manna Gums have quite variable growth forms. In the Strathbogies it is often straight and tall (25-50m) in forested areas, but spreads its branches when in isolation on a paddock. On sandy coastal soils it may only reach 5-10m and often has a sprawling multistemmed form, which is quite beautiful. Manna Gums often have long ribbons of bark on the lower trunk. The timber is not particularly durable, nor is it very good firewood (it burns too quickly), so in many areas it has not been extensively logged or cut, thus remains fairly abundant. However, it is of high value to one of our local furry friends, the koala - Manna Gum is one of their most preferred food trees in Victoria (note: koala food tree preferences vary substantially across their large distribution from SA and Vic to northern Qld). If you are keen to plant some native trees for wildlife, Manna Gums are a good species to include in the mix of trees you choose, and they can grow quite rapidly, which is always nice to see on an area you have recently planted.





SnakeTails



Many of you may know Rob is called out for snake removals as part of our Wildlife Shelter activities. Occasionally the snake is located in the house hiding behind or under cupboards or furniture, even once under the doona on a bed. Most times the snake is holed up outside under a fixture or quite often caught up in bird netting requiring removal by holding the bitey end in the snake catching clamp while the assistant (me) carefully snips away the netting from the snake body to prevent further injury to it and allow rehabilitation to the wild.

At home, along the edges of the bird netting covering the blueberry groves, we use solar powered snake repellers that vibrate in the ground. I have watched a

video purporting these do not work but, anecdotally, for our purposes they certainly appear to. Mostly Red -bellied Black snakes and Eastern Browns live on our property in Merton. We check our nets daily and have found entangled snakes only when the battery has failed. Perhaps certain snakes are not affected by the frequency however snake repellers seem to be useful here.

There are many snakes in our region living amongst our dwellings, most people are not aware of their prevalence as the snakes are more scared of you and quickly bolt when feeling your approach. Rob is often asked to attend snakes that have been "seen" with the caller not realising that snake is generally not going to be catchable unless it is in a contained place, Rob then has wasted his time and petrol chasing a ghost. When caught the snakes are released in isolated locations near creek beds, unless it's a Red-belly then it's brought home and released on our property as they have a liking for eating the young of Brown snakes which Rob considers a charming trait. The Browns however are also handy at rodent catching so it's a toss-up which may be your favourite!

Don't try to catch them unless you have the snake catching equipment, back away quietly and keep your dogs restrained. Make sure your children wear sturdy boots when going for walks and not to put their hands under sheeting or timber to retrieve objects. All rural property owners should have a snake-bite kit and know how to respond if bitten by a snake.

Keep in mind that the most dangerous animals in Australia are humans, horses, cows, dogs (just saying).

Peranbin Primary College Strathbogie Campus

In Visual Art we have been having a great time painting in both the Senior and Junior classes. In the Senior Art class we have been creating monochromatic paintings. The first one of a full moon shining bright in the night sky with reflections and clouds. We explored systematic ways to create tints and tones with the paint and techniques when using a paintbrush to blend the colours. We used a similar technique to create a mountainous or hilly landscape and discussed how this can create a sense of space in the composition. In the Junior Room we have been experimenting with pouring paint and paper folding to create symmetrical butterfly's and words, the effects have been very exciting. The students have been further developing these experiments with a paint and brush as well as using coloured sand to add texture. We are hoping to enter the Honeysuckle Art Show at Violet Town.







All Peranbin students are attending the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show on the 31st of March. Each campus has created a scarecrow to enter in the Reuse and Recycle Sustainable Scarecrow Competition. We look forward to seeing our scarecrow amongst all the others.

We have also kicked off another artistic venture with everyone creating a germ shape to form a mural in the breezeway between the buildings. The mural is part of Paint Australia Beautiful campaign which is an extension of Keep Australia Beautiful. We love that everyone, from the youngest to the eldest, has input from the very beginning in these activities. As part of Clean Up Australia we donned our hats and



gloves and headed out to pick up any rubbish along Main St and Armstrong Avenue. We found a lot of cigarette butts, a variety of plastic wrappers, a glass bottle and more. Once back at school we sorted our discoveries into types of materials and which could be recycled and which were rubbish. The most exciting find was a small snake skeleton.

We are looking forward to having some of the members of Euroa Hockey Club join us for PE. There will be four sessions where we combine to provide students with highly skilled coaches to develop understanding and skills of the game. 

Emotional Female by Yumiko Kadota, Vintage, 2021



This is not a book about menopause – thankfully! This Australian-Japanese writer is a medical doctor, who is driven to recount the tortuous passage that awaits emerging female, and not a few male, medical graduates. It is an eye-opening and somewhat dispiriting story. Why? Because the misogyny and male entitlement that have been exposed and countered by brave professional women, the #MeToo movement, and, not least, by our very own former PM, Julia Gillard, seem to be alive and well in the esteemed corridors of the medical profession. As with any counter-culture movement, it's unfair to generalize. Kadota does come across nice, civilized specialist surgeons, radiologists, etc, who are prepared to listen, advise and remain aware of the very daunting prospect that young doctors face when starting out; however, there are also some 'gasp-aloud' moments in this long recount, where men who should know a whole lot better demean their status either verbally or, in some cases, physically. It's not just the young female doctors who suffer under the patients too, are at times treated with contempt, making Dr Kadota squirm and feel powerless in the face of thoughtless arrogance.

Yumiko Kadota presents as a driven, high-achieving and very capable student and graduate, who sets her heart on becoming a plastic surgeon, only to watch her dream unravelling due to being overlooked for promotion, excessively long work hours and second-rate postings. In short, it is a story of exhaustion and emotional and physical burnout, and thus, it's an important book, not just for medicos, but for the 'glamour' professions, many of which are still male-dominated domains, and which demand huge time commitment and soul-destroying competition. By all accounts, it has made waves both in Australia and internationally, in particular among the emerging doctors of tomorrow. Hopefully, overdue change will come.


The program will begin each week with a lecture followed by an educational field trip. The course is being offered in partnership with DEECA and Victorian National Parks Association.
