The Bookshelf - notes from the Bohomians Bookclub



Limberlost by Robbie Arnott, Text Publishing, 2022

Our February read took us inside the head of a teenage boy, Ned West, growing up in the Tamar River valley in north-eastern Tasmania during the '40's. Ned lives on an apple orchard with his father, his mother having died when he was very young. Two older brothers are away at war, and the family's fear and longing for them is a constant thread throughout the book. His older sister returns to live on the farm; however, his relationship with his father and sister, both of whom are distracted in different ways by the agony of war, remains distant. Although he knows nothing about sailing, Ned is driven by a secret desire to own a boat. He aims to sail up to the mouth of the Tamar river, the location of a terrifying childhood boat ride to see a legendary whale. With single-minded determination, Ned spends much time trapping rabbits to fund this dream.

Our experience through Ned's eyes strongly evokes the challenges and pleasures of a lonely teenage boy in rural Tasmania. We share with him the difficulties and mysteries of relationships with family, friends, and a halting love

interest. With him we take tentative steps and mis-steps toward adulthood as his role in the family evolves. Together we are immersed in the wonders and terrors of the natural world. As we learn more about Ned's life, we are able to understand how the events of Ned's childhood shape the man he becomes.

Arnott's writing in this, his third book, is a joy, beautifully descriptive and evocative of the stunning Tasmanian bushland and the river that are embedded in Ned's being. We are immediately pulled into experiencing all the sensations of each place and event by Arnott's eloquent words. Although some characters and events are only briefly touched on, Arnott succinctly and accurately captures their essence. The pace of the book feels much like the sailboat that Ned dreams of, sometimes quieter, sometimes rougher, or meandering pleasantly, with currents and whirlpools that take us forward or back to Ned's different life experiences and memories. Enjoyed by every member of the bookclub, we highly recommend this book.

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Pet regos will land in your mailbox soon



Strathbogie Shire Council is reminding pet owners that registrations are due for renewal by April 10, 2024.

Residents with registered pets will soon receive a notice in the mail with their annual registration fee invoice.

Strathbogie Shire Council
Administrator Peter Stephenson said
it was also a timely reminder for
anyone who may have recently
welcomed a new cat or dog to the
home, or if you've recently moved to
the area, you must register your pet
with Council.

"It is an easy process to register your

pet with Council. All you need to do is visit our Council offices at 109A Binney St, Euroa, or 293 High Street, Nagambie, complete a pet registration form, and pay your fee with our friendly customer service team," Mr Stephenson said.

"Cats and dogs aged three months or older must be registered with Council and they must be microchipped prior to registration.

"Registering your dog or cat is important for so many reasons. Your pet wearing the Council's disc improves the chances of your animal being returned to you if it becomes lost and provides a whole range of other important services, including:

A Council identification tag for your pet to wear.

Lost and found service: a guarantee that if your pet is found wearing the council identification marker, you will be notified.

Council services to respond to calls about wandering dogs or dog attacks. This includes removal of aggressive dogs from the streets, so you and your pet can walk in safety.

Council services to deal with nuisance problems. These services manage issues like barking dogs, cat trespass, and unowned animals.

Council control of 'dangerous', 'menacing' and 'restricted breed' dogs in your area. This ensures they do not pose a threat to the community.

Council monitoring of pet shops, boarding kennels, catteries, pounds, shelters, and pet breeding and training businesses. This ensures they meet the strict animal welfare standards required by Animal Welfare Victoria.

A State Government education program for schools. This program makes visits to all Primary Schools in Victoria. It teaches children about safety with dogs, and how to be a responsible pet owner.

A State Government education program for pre-schools. This program teaches children and parents how to avoid dog attacks in the home and in public places.

"We're encouraging members of the community to be responsible pet owners, register your pet and make sure it wears its ID tag at all times," Mr Stephenson said.

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

The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

Tell Me Why: The Story of My Life and My Music, by Archie Roach, Simon & Schuster, 2020

The late legendary singersongwriter and Indigenous activist. Archie Roach, who died in 2022, has left a stunning autobiography.

Archie Roach was a Gunditimara and Bundialung elder, born in Mooroopna, Victoria in 1956. As a toddler, he was taken from his parents by welfare officers: his aunt tried to scare them away with a gun and his cousins hid him under a pile of leaves, to no avail. Thus, he became one of the tens of thousands of Indigenous

children taken from their families the Stolen Generation. In spite of

his foster family being kind and loving Scottish immigrants, his early loss indelibly marked his life and music, causing him to embark on an often-tortured search for his family, and to pour his pain into songs that earned him both local and international fame.

Archie did find his siblings along that painful journey, but, like many of his Indigenous peers, he sought relief from inconsolable loss in alcohol and cannabis, resulting in him roaming from place to place, sleeping rough and, ultimately, serious damage to his health. "For years I'd walked around with this burden, not just of being removed, but of who I was removed from: my mother and father," he said in 2018. Fortunately, he also found the love of his life and rock-solid support in fellow musician, Ruby Hunter and, together, they formed their own family, raising two sons and travelling Australia and the world with their music.

Archie's Roach's autobiography is a very important book. It reveals, in a clear, unadorned voice, the undeniable truth of the unhealed wound in the body of the Australian nation: "We still need to own the whole history of this country and be honest and courageous," he said. "It's the only way we're going to move on."

Archie doesn't preach or indulge in self-pity; he lays his story out in a voice that speaks in simple, clear tones, much as if he was having a one-on-one conversation with the reader. There is sadness and humour, anger and forgiveness, despair and resilience, and thus, this book is both difficult and easy to read. Hopefully, it is on the permanent senior school reading list and a hot favourite for every bookclub in Australia.

Archie's music, which includes 10 studio albums and opening for, variously, a host of musical luminaries such as Tracy Chapman, Bob Dylan, Leonard Cohen and Billy Bragg, has won numerous awards and a huge following. The legacy he has left in his music is a voice for the suffering and loss of First Nations Australians and First Nations people worldwide, a beautifully framed, cracked mirror for all Australians. and a call to the world for more love and compassion.

Out of the ashes, Archie Roach created diamonds.

Recipes of the Month: Two Scone Recipes

Lemonade Scones

MacIntosh Family

Ingredients

31/2 cups SR flour 1 cup cream 1 cup lemonade Pinch of salt

Method

Preheat oven to 220 degrees

Place flour into a medium bowl and make a well in the centre. Add cream and lemonade, stir gently with a spatula until the dough starts to come together. Turn mixture onto a lightly floured surface, gently bring together. Flatten dough with the palm of your hand until 2-3cm thick.

Use a 6.5cm cutter to cut scones and brush with milk.

Bake for 12-15 minutes or until golden.

Nan's Plain Scones — Jane Broughton

Ingredients

2 cups SR flour 1 teaspoon Baking Powder Pinch of salt 1/2 cup of cream 1 cup milk



Method

Preheat oven to 200 degrees. Sift the dry ingredients together. Add the milk and cream to form a soft dough. Lightly roll or press out dough onto a floured surface. Use a cutter to cut out scones and place on an over tray. Bake in a hot oven for 10-15 minutes.

Note: Nan would always mix her scones with a fork. claiming it helped to keep them lighter. I think It was just her years of experience though.



STAG update from March 2024 Meeting

Items discussed.

GENERATORS AT GOLF CLUB AND REC RESERVE

There is a lot of discussion about the generator at the Recreation Reserve regarding it's on going use during power outages.

The Generator at the Golf club was purchased some time ago for use during emergencies, as the Golf Club is the Bushfire Place of Last Resort. We were advised that the generator is being checked and started by Wally every other month.

UPPER BOHO STORM DAMAGE – STAG contacted the shire about the clean-up from storm damage in Upper Boho Rd. It is important for community to log a report to the shire about damage. Shire is then aware of the problem and can proceed with repairs. The shire asks to be made aware of the seriousness of the damage particularly after the initial clearing of the roads.

STAG have finalised the action plan points. These have been sent to Jean McKinnon at the Shire, who will complete it and make it available to all Tableland residents as soon as it is done.

People are still putting rubbish & plastic bags in and around the recycle bins which not only creates a terrible eyesore at our recreation reserve, but stops the contents of the recycle bins from been recycled. If bottles, etc are put in plastic bags, or rubbish is put into the recycle bins, the whole lot is then sent to landfill and not recycled. There is a continual problem with sorting, landfill rubbish being put into bins and litter all around the area. How can we solve this problem? Any suggestions please?

Please use the recycle bins correctly and show you care about our environment.

Wildlife signage on our roads is a high priority for our area, and we will be pursuing it vigorously. Stuart has put forward a proposal to the Council's Pitch my Project and is still waiting to hear back. It seems that the Shire will not be involved but if so, we will be pursuing it as a community project.

New Strathbogie Tableland brochures – The Communications committee will be updating the Strathbogie Tableland brochure which describes local places of interest. We look forward to seeing the results.



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

A talk by Neil Phillips



Sunday, 14th April at 11.30am at the Strathbogie Hall with a light lunch to follow.

Neil has been studying the geology of the Strathbogie Ranges for many years and has presented the findings in short talks and field excursions from Tallarook to Swanpool. The Strathbogie Granite Project is a collaboration of his field studies, combined with the expertise of colleagues at the University of Melbourne, Stellenbosch University in South Africa and with input from colleagues in Portugal. Neil's presentation will draw upon recordings taken on the plateau with much of the work being done


on private property: permission for this work is greatly appreciated.

The granite geology plays a part in so many of the landforms and features we see on the plateau from the iconic boulders to extensive rock slabs, waterfalls, steep scarps, perched paddocks and seeps and bogs halfway up hillsides. This granite body covers 2000 sq km and there are some interesting variations between the four main plateaus of Tallarook, Highlands, Seven

Creeks and Mt Samaria.

Neil's love affair with the Strathbogie Ranges began with mapping around Mt Strathbogie as an undergraduate student and has continued to the present day. He regularly imparts his knowledge and understanding of the Strathbogie granite formations to various community groups as seminars and on field trips.

There will be a brief Landcare Meeting beforehand with reports from our sub committees including Tree Planting plans for this year; progress with our pasture trials; and other work that Strathbogie Landcare is undertaking.
