

Pitch My Project Success – it's time to have your say!

Strathbogie Tableland residents – it's time to have your say on your favourite community Projects. Strathbogie Memorial Hall Committee Inc. has pitched for a generator and rewiring the hall. Strathbogie Tableland Action Group Inc. has pitched a feasibility study for a footpath along Spring Creek Road between Main Street and the Recreation Ground. Both have made the final Pitch my Project list of 15 to be voted on by all Strathbogie Shire communities.

Strathbogie Shire Council has released its draft 2024–25 budget to public consultation and is calling on the community to have its say on its favourite projects in the **Pitch My Project** initiative.

Administrator Peter Stephenson said this year \$300,000 has been allocated to projects across the shire. It is time for the community to help decide which projects will be included in the final 2024–25 budget. 'We want to fund and deliver projects which reflect the community's priorities.'

This is the fourth year Council has run Pitch My Project and this year Council received a healthy 15 eligible projects which are now on the Share Strathbogie website for people to view and prioritise. 'We want as many people as possible to help us prioritise the projects to be included in our final 2024–25 Budget,' Mr Stephenson said.



STAG Report

(Tableland Talk)

STAG held their meeting at the Strathbogie Hall on Sunday 21st April at 9.30am finishing at 10.45am.

What does STAG stand for and what do they do???

Strathbogie Tablelands Action Group

We are a community elected committee of 12 members of the community.

We advocate for the entire tablelands, not just Strathbogie Township. There are several community groups and committees, and we all do something different, but we are united by STAG.

STAG will liaise with the relevant people in the shire for roads, footpaths, streetscapes, other capital works and initiate the communication needed to help the community to get funding through grants.

This month at our meeting we thought it would be a good idea for all the groups, committees and clubs to, once a year, in February, have a group meeting and pool all our ideas and need. To discuss and apply for grants as a whole community, so we can support each other's endeavours and have a strategic approach to obtaining funding.

This will kick off for this financial year in June 16th when we will hold 'The Grand Grant' meeting.

The Strathbogie Council held the Strathbogie Tableland Local Area Emergency Plan (LEAP) Community consultation day on Sunday 21st April at the golf club, to hear what our community wants/ expects from the Council and other services to provide, after an emergency event hits our Tableland.

Roads

Creek Junction road is open but still doesn't have lines marked.

Euroa—Strathbogie Road near Mt. Wombat turnoff is completed, with the turn into Mackrells Road greatly improved for large vehicles, trucks, tractors.

It looks like Harry's Creek road upgrade is about to begin. Patience is needed from all of us, as this is a very big job, to be done properly this time. It will take considerable time.

Bonnie Doon Road sides have been cleared from much of the debris after the storms.

Upper Boho road is still a work in process. Remember, if you have a problem with your road, put in an official report to the shire so they know where the problem is.

We are still in consultation with the Council in an attempt to have some type of signage warning of animals on our roads.



Strathbogie Shire residents – have your say on our budget!

Strathbogie Shire Council has released the draft 2024–25 budget and fees and charges for public feedback. Administrator Peter Stephenson said the draft budget is a significant document for Council as it sets out how we plan to allocate money for our capital works and community services programs – and the resources required to deliver these.

'In preparing the draft 2024–25 budget Council has tried to balance community expectations and benefits with financial responsibilities,' Mr Stephenson said. 'We have prepared the draft budget based on a 2.75 per cent increase in the average rate per property which is in line with the increase allowed under the State Government's Fair Go Rates legislation. 'Rates for individual properties will vary depending on how that property's valuation has changed compared to the average increase,' said Mr Stephenson.

The draft budget provides \$11.977 million for our capital works program, together with \$2.972 million carried forward from 2023–24. This includes \$5.79 million on roads, \$746,000 for bridges, \$344,000 for footpaths and cycleways, \$1.015 million for recreation, leisure and community facilities and \$1.16 million for parks, open spaces and streetscapes.

Have your say on the Council Plan update!

The Strathbogie Council Plan is updated each year and the draft 2024-25 action plan is now open for public feedback. Administrator Peter Stephenson said this is the fourth and final year of the 2021-25 Council Plan prior to a new plan being developed following the October 2024 Local Government Elections.

Feedback closes 5.00pm on 24 May 2024.

The 2021-25 Council Plan is the key strategic document governing allocation of human and financial resources at Council and outlines the actions and strategies used to achieve our Community Vision. 'By reviewing and updating it each year we can make sure it stays relevant and responsive to unforeseen issues or significant changes impacting our community,' said Mr Stephenson. 'This update includes the development of the Euroa Railway Precinct Master Plan, adoption of the Urban Growth and Land Use strategies and establishing a significant tree register – and many others. 'It has been standard practice for Council to update its plan at the same time as the budget and we encourage the community to have their say on both,' said Mr Stephenson. The updated action plan aligns directly with the funding priorities and key initiatives in the budget – and both documents are now open for public comment.

Draft Council Governance Rules – have your say!

Strathbogie Shire Council is seeking input into an amended draft of the governance rules. Administrator Peter Stephenson said since the 2023 review we have identified some necessary amendments which will result in clearer processes, as well as updating the Election Period Policy in readiness for the October 2024 Local Government Elections.

Governance rules are required under section 60 of the Local Government Act 2020 (The Act) and determine how Councils make decisions fairly and in the best interests of the Strathbogie Shire community. 'Our draft governance rules underpin the decision-making processes of Council and are a way in which the overarching governance, and supporting principles of The Act are implemented on a day-to-day basis,' said Mr Stephenson.

Governance rules include:

- □ Conflicts of interest processes
- □ Mayor and Deputy Mayor and relevant committee chair election processes
- Council meeting, Audit and Risk Committee and other delegated and community asset committee procedures

□ Election Period Policy.

Burning Off in Autumn? Make sure you do it right!

As fire restrictions ease around the state, EPA Victoria is warning landholders that what they toss into the flames while burning off this autumn could be costly for the environment and their hip pocket. EPA Northeast Regional Manager, Ben Kneebone, says many waste items create toxic smoke and residue as they burn.

"Burning farm waste like silage wrap, old tyres and chemical drums sends smoke and other residue into the atmosphere, waterways and soil," Mr Kneebone said. "Don't let a routine burnoff turn into something that contaminates your land or neighbouring properties; send any waste to an appropriately permitted facility," he said.

There's a handy publication dealing with waste disposal and recycling on the EPA website at epa.vic.gov.au/about-epa/publications/iwrg641-1 If you are burning fallen trees or other natural wood, make sure they are as dry as possible to limit the volume of smoke, and farmers should make sure they have any relevant council or CFA permits. Timber from buildings, furniture or other manufactured products is not safe to burn because it has probably been chemically treated and would be considered waste.

EPA can fine offenders more than \$9,000 for burning anything other than vegetation-sourced matter like timber and crop stubble. "Farmers understand how important a clean environment is to their livelihood and their community," Mr Kneebone said. "By thinking twice about what goes onto the pile when burning off, you can protect the environment from contamination of the soil, water and air around your farm and your neighbours," he said. "You can also protect yourself from a hefty fine, which EPA would consider if we find evidence on illegal matter getting burned."

The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub


Normal People by Sally Rooney, Faber & Faber Ltd, 2018

This novel has earned a veritable multitude of rave reviews from a wide range of illustrious sources, from the Times Literary Supplement, the Guardian, the New York Times, the Economist, to name but a few; the flyleaf lists a mere nine (!) awards, and the author is heralded as the "novelist defining a generation." *Normal People* is also available to watch as a miniseries on Stan and Hulu, and was republished as a paperback in 2022. Moreover, it is listed as 'one of Taylor Swift's favourite books'!! The latter accolade is telling. The target audience for *Normal People* is seen, variously, as 13 to 23, 18 to 30 and 20 to 30.

Irish boy (Connell) meets Irish girl (Marianne) in senior school. Girl is a victim of emotional and physical abuse from her wealthy family and unsympathetic peers. Boy experiences anxiety and depression as he enters early adulthood. Boy and girl move through and around each other while at Trinity College, Dublin, entering a variety of other relationships, always finding their way back to each other, where they find they are able to 'get' and comfort each other. The future of Marianne and Connell's relationship is left up to the reader to determine.

If the synopsis above reads as a somewhat unsympathetic take on this novel, then so be it. To be fair, the dialogue is deftly handled and a number of more peripheral characters are swiftly and capably developed, but Marianne and Connell's journey as friends/lovers/friends and lovers/friends and sometimes lovers is weighted down by the inconclusive stops and starts of their relationship encapsulated within the choppy structure of the novel. Perhaps Rooney's intention was to capture the awkwardness and emotional gymnastics of late adolescence/early adulthood, and if so, she succeeds in that. However, one's reading lifespan as a mature-age reader is perhaps too short to engage in extended reflection on a period that, while necessary and instructive, is best shelved for occasional reminiscence. So many good books to read; so little time, but if you're aged between 18 and 30, go for it!

- 1 tspn chicken stock
- Bacon pieces
- Mozzarella cheese
