# Strathbogie Pitch my Project Success

Council has endorsed six projects across the Shire as part of the Pitch My Project initiative. Fifteen projects were originally presented to the community for a vote.

The Strathbogie Tableland Action Group Pitch my Project application reflected ongoing support for a new footpath in the town. Strathbogie Tablelanders have successfully voted to see budget funding for a feasibility study into the construction of a footpath along Spring Creek Road between the Recreation Reserve and Main Street.

This part of Spring Creek Road is currently dangerous for walkers. Along some stretches there is no off road walking option at all. Surfaces are uneven. Some corners are blind and vehicle speed is a walker safety issue.

Much of the nature strip has been mown or partially cleared. Ausnet cleared the land under powerlines of much of the native vegetation in 2023.

Areas of high conservation value will be assessed. The viability of footpath construction that preserves remnant native vegetation will be a key consideration of the feasibility study.

Shirewide, the successful projects are:



- \$50,000 for Strathbogie Walking Path feasibility study (provisionally based on seeking further advice and direction from the Department of Environment, Energy and Climate Action regarding native vegetation impacts)
- \$50,000 for Euroa Strathbogie Shire Art Trail
- \$50,000 for Euroa Branding Project Stage 2
- \$50,000 for Longwood Nature Play Space Stage 2
- \$50,000 for Avenel Memorial Hall
- \$50,000 for Ruffy Tablelands Centre Verandah



# The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

French Braid by Anne Tyler, Penguin Random House, UK, 2022.



According to the fly pages of *French Braid*, this is Anne Tyler's twenty-fourth novel. In 1989, she won the Pulitzer Prize for her novel, *Breathing Lessons*, and in 2011, she was short-listed for the Man Booker International Prize for her entire body of work. Her 1985 novel, *The Accidental Tourist*, was made into a hugely successful film, and other works have been adapted for TV and film. In short, Tyler has long been a much-celebrated author.

The over-riding theme of her long list of novels is the family and its often -complicated relationship dynamics. The critic and writer, Michiko Kakutani, wrote, "she has taken as her fictional territory that sprawling American landscape of the middle class, and ... she has claimed as her special province the family in all its contrary dimensions." This is certainly true of *French Braid*. The novel takes as its subject the Garrett family of Baltimore and covers a chronological span of some eighty years. We are introduced to three generations of Garretts – fathers, mothers, cousins, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, daughters, sons, inlaws, grandchildren. Quite a crowd! Anne Tyler stated that, for her, "character is everything. I never did see why I have to throw in a plot, too" (*The Virginia Quarterly Review*,1992). Perhaps this is the key to the generally unfavourable opinions of *French Braid* put forward by the

Bohomians. There is very little plot. Readers are left wondering if a plot exists in (Grandmother) Mercy Garrett's steps towards an independent life by moving out of the marital home to her art studio; this theme, with its echoes of 60's feminism, is developed quite skilfully, and does occupy a central position, but is always an undercurrent. A nod to plot does come in the very final pages where David, the son of Robin and Mercy Garrett, recalls his near-drowning as a seven-year-old in 1959, and the "most peculiar expression" on his father's face as he watched the boy floundering in the deep water. This, we can only conclude, is why David has felt himself to be unlikable all his life and has struggled to be close to his parents. But the threads are too thin and too numerous to hold so many characters and such a time span to amount to a plot. Tyler is, in this, true to her word. So, we must rely on the strength of the characters to bring this tale to life, and that is we feel where the novel truly fails. The characters are not memorable, and their actions and peccadillos and 'little cruelties' within a meandering time structure leave the reader clutching for a branch to hang onto. Perhaps Novel No. 24 suffers from author weariness. In 1998, Kakutani wrote about The Patchwork Planet, Ms. Tyler's famous ability to limn the daily minutiae of life also feels weary and formulaic this time around... "; in 2015, writing about A Spool of Blue Thread, the same critic said, "The problem is that these characters have insinuated themselves so shallowly in the reader's mind that it's hard to care much what happens to any of them." Kakutani's sentiments could apply equally to French Braid.



**Strathbogie Memorial Hall** has been the principal gathering place for community events and meetings since 1955. The Hall was completely renovated in the early 2000s. The large refurbished kitchen can handle large catering demands and a gas barbecue augments the electric stoves, urn and microwave oven with its appropriate crockery, cutlery and cooking equipment.

Next to the kitchen is a spacious supper room which has an excellent permanent exhibition of restored old photographs showing historically important images of life on the Tableland in earlier days.

# For the forest, the gliders & legal safeguards – we're appealing!



As some TT readers will know, local community group Save Our Strathbogie Forest was in the Federal Court earlier this year trying to halt several planned burns in the Strathbogie Forest.



The Strathbogie Forest is home to one of the healthiest populations of the Endangered Greater Glider in Victoria and the planned burns in question are home to healthy numbers of this cuddliest of creatures.

We believe these burns are unnecessarily destructive; there should be a greater regard given to the natural values in the forest and where necessary, burns should be modified to avoid burning critical habitat.

In the court case, the judge found that we had not demonstrated that the burns were a significant threat to the gliders in the burn areas and he allowed the burns in question to proceed, but the court also found that planned burns are subject to

the Federal Environment Act – this represents a significant change to the interpretation of the Act and created new law.

Our legal team, headed by Bleyer Lawyers, will argue that the ruling allowing the government to go ahead with planned burns in the Strathbogie Forest contained errors of law and so we are appealing that decision.

The Appeal will be heard on August 20 and 21 in the Federal Court, Melbourne. # Walk of the Month: Winton Wetlands Sculpture Walk

This fascinating Yorta Yorta Sculpture Walk is called Lotjpatj Natjan Danak, Yarning and Gathering Pathway. It is a creation of cultural works that represent ancestors; totems and special places; spirituality; ceremonies and cultural practices; histories and knowledge systems; ecology and seasons; plants; insects; birds and animals; rivers; creeks; sky stories and ancient creations.

On site amenities include Mokoan Hub and Cafe open 7 days 10am - 4pm, sculpture garden, children's playground, plenty of car parking, clean public toilets, picnic tables, interesting interpretive signage and a meeting place. Included is a visit to the Wetlands Viewing Platform.

The trail follows curving, generally flat gravel pathways and is suitable for all ages. Some areas of gravel are loose, which may necessitate assistance for wheelchair users.

Please respect these cultural works and do not climb. Pets are not permitted in Winton Wetlands.

### TIME TO START PREPARING FOR THE FIRE SEASON

It is only a couple of months before the fire season is upon us again and it is never too early to start preparing. Information to assist is available from a number of websites including the following:

cfa.vic.gov.au redcross.org.au strathbogie.vic.gov.au

In addition, the CFA will hold its Bushfire Sunday information session on 20<sup>th</sup> October.

There are also CFA envelopes with helpful information and brochures available on the PO desk at the Strathbogie Store – please take one.

#### **RECOVERY AFTER BUSHFIRE**

With plenty of information available to assist us to prepare and manage in the event of a bushfire, STAG's Emergency Sub—committee has been focusing on how, as a community, we can help ourselves during the recovery process.

After a bushfire it can be expected that there will be no power, no communication facilities, no access to some areas and, depending on the extent of the emergency, no assistance available from authorities for several days. Therefore we are planning to develop a Community Hub at the Hall which will provide:

- information to assist the community to recover from an emergency
- a venue for authorities and support agencies to interact with the community
- a gathering place for members of the community to interact and support one another

The Hub will contain hard copies of material relating to recovery from a range of organisations including the Department of Health, Department of Agriculture, Strathbogie Shire Council and a range of support agencies.

We are also seeking to develop the following registers to assist during the recovery process.

- A list of volunteers to assist with the Hub (we already have several however we need to be sure that we will have enough people as some may not be available, or have access, after a fire;
- A list of skills within the community: food handling, working with children, mental health, first aid, animal handling, fencing, endorsed licence, and any others you feel will assist during the recovery process;
- Equipment that might be available such as portable stock yards, stock feed, stock truck/transport, horse float, fuel, portable stock feeder, water troughs, handling equipment for large bales and silage, generators, etc.

Details of these lists will not be circulated and will remain with the sub-committee.

# IT IS IMPORTANT THAT THIS INFORMATION IS RETAINED AS IT MAY NOT BE EASILY ACCESSED AFTER A FIRE

### **IMMEDIATELY AFTER A FIRE**

Check with your local emergency services that it is safe to return to your property after a bushfire

Wear protective clothing before entering your property after a bushfire

Hazardous wastes, such as asbestos materials, burnt CCA-treated timber and farm chemicals need special care during handling and disposal

Where possible, try to avoid taking children into fire-damaged properties. If you do, make sure they remain protected at all times

Be aware and avoid hazardous trees and roots.

Be aware of hazards like hotspots and embers, snakes and spiders, fallen power lines, sagging ceilings and electrical faults

Check that power, water, gas and sewerage systems are functioning – you mayneed official safety check

If powerlines have fallen, keep clear and keep others away. The power lines may still be live. Do not attempt to remove or prune trees which have fallen on powerlines.

Take plenty of photos and notes for insurance and future reference.

Protect your drinking water by diverting downpipes for initial flushing

### **OFFERS OF HELP**

During the time immediately after the fire you may be visited by many individuals, organisations, government agencies and others to offer support or collect impact data.

The generosity of individuals and groups in the aftermath of fires can often be overwhelming.

It is recommended you keep a notebook to record names and phone numbers of individuals and organisations, to help you keep track of support provided and for future reference.

You may be reluctant to take advantage of recovery services and offers of help; maybe because you are overwhelmed, or you think others are worse off and in greater need of assistance.

However, when you have lost significant assets or experienced trauma during an incident, these organisations are there to help.

# **Strathbogie Township Streetscape Update**

As you may be aware, all kerb works have been completed, and the plan is to pour concrete on the pathways. However, due to rain, this has been postponed, and the work, including the driveways, will be done the first week of August, weather permitting. The plan is to complete all civil works by mid-August, though there might be some delays due to the expected rains.

Sourcing asphalt to reinstate the road is challenging these days as the Shepparton plants are not operating. However, the contractor is exploring alternative options for sourcing asphalt as advised by the council. Depending on the completion of the civil works, landscape reinstatements will be done a couple of weeks afterward. Council are aiming to complete the project by the end of August based on the current progress.

Council already have the furniture (two seats and two bins) delivered to the Euroa Depot, ready to be installed once the concrete works are completed.

Council appreciates the patience and great support from STAG and the Strathbogie community throughout this project.
