

THE BOHOMIANS BOOK CLUB REVIEW OF

The Mountains Sing by Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai (2020)



Vivid, gripping, and steeped in the language and traditions of Viêt Nam, celebrated Vietnamese poet Nguyen's richly lyrical debut weaves between the lives of grandmother and granddaughter to paint a unique picture of the country's turbulent 20th century history. This is the story of a people pushed to breaking point, and a family who refuse to give in. A compassionate exploration and clear-eyed account of the multigenerational trauma experience by the Vietnamese people, the novel is narrated from the dual perspectives of Hương, affectionately known as Guava, and her grandmother, Trần Diêu Lan.

In 1972 Hà Noi, Hương and her grandmother cling to one another in their improvised shelter as American bombs fall around them. Her father and mother have already left to fight in a war that is tearing not just her country but her family apart. Diệu Lan begins to tell Guava about her childhood, the Japanese occupation in the 1940s and the

ensuing famine, followed by the disastrous land reform by the Communists of the 1950s. Traumatised by witnessing her father's cold-blooded murder by Japanese soldiers, the experience of her brother and son being lynched by resentful Vietnamese neighbours during the communist annexe felt horribly familiar. Diệu Lan became a pariah overnight, her home overrun, fleeing her village with five of her six children and heading to Hà Nội in hope her childhood teacher would give her family shelter. A refugee in her own country she survives by eating grass, begging and the kindness of strangers.

Nguyễn spares us none of the unremittingly bleak circumstances that lead to Diệu Lan's penury. Her novel's structure inevitably decreases narrative tension – we know that Diệu Lan survives the tragedies life throws at her. However, Nguyễn makes up for this with her atmospheric settings: "We sat on a stone bench, under an ancient tree with its many branches reaching down to the lake's surface ... in the midst of the water, the Turtle tower glimmered in the afternoon light, moss greening its walls" Her novel teems with colourful characters, and spirits with evocative names such as the Water Devil and Wicked Ghost (the money collector).

In Hà Nội, Diệu Lan rebuilds her life from scratch, trains as a teacher and enjoys a brief respite until conflict tears her family apart again. During the final years of the Việt Nam war, Diệu Lan, determined to shield her beloved granddaughter from destitution, becomes an illegal trader; an act vilified by their neighbours and even her own son. Hương is shunned by her classmates and finds solace in the banned foreign books her grandmother procures for her. Books allow her to empathise with the 'enemy' and help her to appreciate life's simple pleasures.

A powerful motif in the novel is that of the songbird. During the war, Hương's father carves her an exquisite wooden bird: Its name, Sơn ca, means "the mountain sings". When the bird opens its throat, the mountains appear to sing as well. It becomes a poetic symbol of hope: "the Sơn ca's songs can reach Heaven, and souls of the dead can return in the Sơn ca's singing." Hương discovers that words pave the way to personal happiness and, like the bird, her own songs carry the promise of peace and renewal.

Being a fiction, this is also a personal work of the author's yearning to know her own grandmothers and bringing to life the under-represented women and children who often suffer the consequences of wars the most. By her own account, she is also acutely aware of the irony of writing this book in English," the language of invasive military powers and cultures". Since the end of the Việt Nam War, tremendous progress has been made in terms of reconciliation between Việt Nam and the United States. But the deep wounds that divided countries and families, both at home and in the diaspora, remain profound and painful. For that reason, The Mountains Sing places the Vietnamese people at the centre of the Việt Nam War in the hope that it will help healing as well as discovering our common humanity, as in the words of Hương: "Somehow I was sure that if people were willing to read each other, and see the light of other cultures, there would be no war on earth."

The following information is from Agriculture Victoria and Animal Welfare Victoria

Pets Affected by Smoke and Ash

Smoke inhalation in pets can be dangerous to their health. Signs of smoke inhalation may include inflammation to their airways, coughing, increased rate or difficulty in breathing. Should you think your animals have been affected by smoke, if possible, seek advice from your local vet.

Ash and soot from fires may impact your animals. They may try to groom themselves, but the ash and soot can be harmful. If your animals are affected, wash them as you normally would with mild detergents to remove anything covering their fur or feathers.

Clean the feet of pets as they come back indoors if they have run through ask.

Avoid leaving pet food and water bowls outdoors - clean and fill them daily.

If you need to evacuate, take your pets with you. Note that relief centres may not have the capacity to accommodate animals.

Stock Water Impacted by Bushfire Ash and Debris

After a fire has passed through you may find burnt material, ash and soil from paddocks in water sources used by livestock. Once in the water these materials promote the growth of bacteria and algae. These organisms then rapidly multiply, using up the oxygen in the water and causing the water source to become poor in quality.

- Provide troughs where possible instead of relying on creeks and dams they are easier to monitor and clean. Reducing the distance stock need to travel to water can improve their ability to cope in difficult conditions.
- Monitor water temperature stock will not drink hot water
- Monitor turbidity stock will not want to drink dirty water
- Remember to watch water sources and dams for the carcasses of dead animals prompt removal of carrion decreases the risk of botulism.

Symptoms of a poor-quality water source may include dark water, a bad smell and black scum around the dam's edge. Thick scum around the water's edge may also prevent animals accessing the water. Animal carcasses should be removed immediately.

Aeration, clarification and/or chlorination will resolve most water quality issues resulting from burnt material entering dams.

Pumping water into a tank, treating that water and then reticulating it to troughs is ideal as this provides the aeration component and water in tanks won't be impacted when the next rain event brings more ash and debris from the fire-ground into the dam. Check temperature within the troughs on hot days as livestock will avoid hot water.

If ash and other soil material enters a dam it will eventually settle by itself and can be removed with an excavator. However, it is best to intercept this material upslope of your dam or within the surrounding catchment if possible.

While bushfire debris remains in the environment, fencing on the windward side of the dam using closely woven material (such as hessian or silt mesh) can trap wind-blown material before it reaches the water. Sediment traps can also be used to filter out ash and debris in upstream creeks and gullies that flow into a dam when it rains. These can be made using small rock mounds or wooden pickets lined with a permeable fabric, coil logs or hay bales on their upstream face that allow the water to filter through before entering the dam.

Mt Wombat Lookout Walk (link: Mt Wombat Lookout Walk, Strathbogie - Walking Maps)

Mt Wombat Flora and Fauna Reserve. Corner of Mt Wombat Rd and Mt Wombat Lookout Rd. Strathbogie



The walk, the forest, the fauna, the flora, the fungi, the views, the joy. This is a beautiful 5.7km return walk. The dirt track is also used by people driving vehicles to the summit exclusively for the view. However, walkers have the advantage of experiencing all the other pleasures the reserve has to offer along the way. The gradient increases to a steep rise near the summit. Driving part of the way is an option for a shorter walk.

At 799m, Mt Wombat Lookout offers an excellent 360 degree vista. There are views to Mt Buller, Waranga Basin and Goulburn Weir at Nagambie in the distance.

The summit is home to communications towers and a Forest Fire Management (FFM) Lookout. During fire

season, a watchful eye is kept on the surrounding region. Mt Macedon, Mt Matlock and Mt Useful are other FFM Lookouts that can be seen from Mt Wombat.

A Trigonometric Point is also located at the summit. These typically consist of a black disc on four metal legs or a pillar, resembling a navigation beacon. Another disc is located directly below the centre point or on the pillar itself. Trig points are generally located on prominent points in the landscape. These points were useful to surveyors as reference points for measuring distance, direction and assisting in the creation of maps. For those involved with Geocaching Australia, the Mt Wombat trig point is a cache you can log on their website.

Sunrises and sunsets can be as impressive as you could wish for. Watching approaching storms is an awesome experience. Observing resident wedge tailed eagles riding thermals at their flight height is something special as well.



The Flora and Fauna Reserve offers many natural world delights. Messmate, bluegum and stringybark dominate the canopy. Seasonal changes make this a location worth exploring all year round. Summer can be harsh and dry; autumnal fungi displays add colour to shortening days; winter offers wet ferny hollows,



falls, orchids, mosses, liverworts and lichens; spring sees native wildflowers appear in abundance. And don't forget to keep your eyes open for the local wildlife.

There is even more to this fascinating reserve though. Woodland often gives way to massive slabs of granite, jewel like baubles of stone litter the ground to complement weathered rock flakes in every shape and size you can imagine. Rocky prominences invite climbing. Huge boulders require skirting. Giant marbles appear tenuously fixed in position, looking like a gentle push should send them crashing to forest floor hundreds of metres below.

There's a lot more to Mt Wombat than many think. Next visit, don't just stop at the top, walk further afield. Mt Wombat is a wonderland in its own right.

Recipe of the Month:

Temple Tomato Rasam

Ingredients

150g red lentils

1tsp cumin

3cm grated ginger

3 cloves crushed garlic

1 green finger chilli

2 tbspn canola oil

15 curry leaves

1tspn mustard seeds

3/4 tspn ground black pepper

4 large tomatoes (or tinned)

11/2 tspn tamarind paste

1 tspn salt

Method

Wash the lentils until water is clear. Saute curry leaves mustard seeds, cumin, and pepper in oil. After leaves begin to crackle add ginger, garlic and chilli. Cook 3 min and add tomatoes. Cook 4 min until "jammy".

Add drained lentils, tamarind paste and 800ml hot water. Cover and simmer for 20min or until lentils are soft. Serve with Basmati rice.
