

### LAST MINUTE FIRE INFORMATION

Over recent months the community has been provided with information from the CFA on how to prepare for the bushfire season and what to do in the event of a fire, while STAG's Emergency sub-committee has been developing plans to assist the community during the recovery period should we be unfortunate enough to experience a bushfire.

Important points to remember:

During the first 72 hours following a major fire, you can expect that there will be no power, no internet/mobile reception, no water and no road access. It is unlikely that emergency services and support organisations will be available during this initial period.

You should ensure that you have a battery-operated radio (with spare batteries) and tune to ABC FM97.7 for reports on the situation.

If the situation permits, an Emergency Recovery Hub will be established at the Hall; it is important to note that this is only for recovery after a fire and is **NOT** the Neighbourhood Place of Last Resort which will be at the Golf Club during a fire.

The Hub will contain a battery-operated radio, power boards with USB charging outlets, bottled water, tea, coffee, etc.

It will also contain hard copies of relevant material to assist with recovery such as:

Basic First Aid (exposure to smoke, burns, snake bite, etc.)
Management of stock, water supply, etc. (from the
Department of Agriculture)

Maps showing the location of existing fires, road closures, etc. Contact details for relevant authorities and organisations

Once access is available, government departments and support groups will provide assistance and the Hub will continue as a venue for them to meet with members of the community.

The Hub will also serve as a place for members of the community to get together and communicate with each other.

The operation of the Hub will rely on volunteers. Obviously, it is not possible to predict who will be available after a fire so it is important to establish a group who are willing to assist if possible.

If you are able to help (situation permitting) we would like to meet at the Rec Ground at 5pm on Thursday 12 December (before pizza night) to briefly provide an overview of what might be involved.

### **STAG** update

The November STAG meeting, held at the Strathbogie Hall was well attended. It was quite a long meeting as we had a number of items to discuss. We also welcomed some new members.

**Strathbogie Tableland Action Plan** – Now that the Action Plan has been completed and released, STAG is looking forward to making it all happen.

**The Grant writing workshop** organised by Jean McKinnon from the Strathbogie Shire Council was at the Strathbogie Hall. Facilitator Megan Buntine, as always, made the afternoon a great success.16 people attended, from Longwood, Ruffy, Euroa, Strathbogie and Boho South. It was vibrant, informative and encouraging. The grant writing process is a most important part of our community's abilities, to improve our facilities, community assets and functions. It is the way it is done now and this workshop helped us all get a handle on the best way forward towards great rural communities.

Emergency Sub Committee – This group is doing an amazing job at preparing strategies for our Tableland Community 'Post Emergency'. The needs of people and animals after a disaster are extensive and this group has created a folder in which emergency relief information can be found, and has put together resources and items which may be needed to create an emergency relief hub (at the Strathbogie Hall) after a significant Tableland emergency. These information folders are at the general store, the three Tableland halls, the recreation reserve and the golf club.

**LEAP-** The LEAP (Local Emergency Action Plan) project is in its final stage. The LEAP document is about to be printed and released to the public. The aim of this action plan is to continue to build greater community resilience, during and after emergencies, by increasing the awareness of our local emergency risks and the steps that our community and individuals can take to prepare for, respond to and recover from these emergencies.

In particular, this action plan will provide avenues to achieve and enhance the plans already developed by our community and provide additional strategies to support people living on the Tableland.

Wildlife Signs – Hopefully you have all noticed the new "Slow down Wildlife Zone" roadside signs.

Signs along the roads to Strathbogie Tableland. Fantastic job to those involved.

**Speed limits change** Safer Roads Strathbogie are forging ahead to get a risk assessment done for our Tableland roads with a view to reducing the speed limit in areas of greatest need.

Strathbogie Tree now has 372 members.

# Court battles fuel ignition – Strathbogie Forest in the Federal Court



Many TT readers will know that over the last 12 months, local environment group Save Our Strathbogie Forest has been engaged in legal proceedings with the Victorian Government (Dept. Energy, Environment & Climate Action). The legal action sought an injunction to halt four planned burns in the Strathbogie Forest pending the referral of those burns to the federal Environment Department under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

The Strathbogie Forest is a recognized stronghold for the endangered Southern Greater Glider (Australia's largest gliding possum) in Victoria. By comparison, many of the

populations of this species elsewhere in Victoria and NSW have declined to the point where the glider has become very rare and even locally extinct. The burn areas at the center of the case were known to support many dozens of Southern Greater Gliders and we believe the burns posed an unacceptable risk.

Our case went to trial in February this year and to appeal in August. The case made several claims and the appeal focused specifically on the impact of planned burns on hollow-bearing trees, the large, often centuries-old eucalypts (particularly manna gums, blue gums and mountain gums) that the glider requires for survival.

Ultimately, our primary claim that the four planned burns were likely to significantly impact the Southern Greater Glider, was rejected by the court and an injunction was not granted. This was incredibly disappointing for those of us that love this forest and have seen the devastating impact that planned burns can have – not just on hollow-bearing trees, but on the forest itself.



However, our legal struggle was not in vain. We succeeded in demonstrating that planned burning is subject o the EPBC Act, something that DEECA has steadfastly denied.

Our case made new law showing - that the state of Victoria (i.e. through the DEECA) does have to comply with the EPBC Act when planning and conducting planned burns, to the extent that planned burning may or is likely to have a significant impact on the Southern Greater Glider.

It's not yet clear how DEECA will choose to comply with this Federal Court finding (though the community will be watching!). What is clear is that, again, it's been the community's collective advocacy and action that has forced the government to lift it's game in order to manage an endangered species and comply with Australian law.

As a small community group, SOSF could never have taken this case to court on its own, and it's appropriate that we use the pages of Tableland Talk to thank all our local friends and supporters that made this possible. Sincere thanks to everyone that gave their time, labour and precious funds to help us meet the legal costs of the case (this alone was a mammoth task!) and to undertake the myriad tasks that brought it all to fruition.

This is the end of a major chapter for SOSF, but it's also the beginning of a new one. 

### The Bookshelf - notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

Diving into Glass by Caro Llewellyn, Penguin, 2019.



Caro Llewellyn's spent a significant slab of her childhood watching as her father struggled to lift a hairbrush but determinedly pushed aside all obstructions to a successful career, public recognition and fatherhood of two families. Richard Llewellyn, paralysed by polio in early adulthood, seemed to his tomboyish daughter to be a hero, someone who never complained, who faced life's difficulties "hard straight" and, immobile in his wheelchair and home-made lifting contraptions, showed her how dignity and triumph could be anyone's, if only they insisted on them. This idolisation is severely tested when the adult Llewellyn is, herself, struck down with MS while on her regular run in her adopted city, New York. She discovers that her father's illness was not, after all, a charm against her own. She finds herself seeking and not at first finding that strength and lack of regret that her father displayed to her as a child. She questions the legacy of

her father to his frightened, infuriated daughter – a legacy she had always believed to be watertight.

This is a bittersweet memoir, written with a biting honesty and the courage to expose her own vulnerability. Llewellyn's telling of her father's and her own journey is, at times, gentle and kind – at others, despairing and full of anger. Above all, it is a story that allows the reader to examine the myths and half-truths that accompany everyone on life's journey; it also demonstrates the uneven path to acceptance and peace of mind

**Caro Llewellyn** is the author of three previous works of nonfiction. She is the former director of several



large-scale literary festivals and cultural events. She has hosted writers from every corner of the globe, including a number of Nobel Prize winners, and presented events at the Sydney Opera House, London's Southbank, the Louvre, and New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, Town Hall, 92Y and historic Cooper Union. She is currently a director at Museums Victoria. *Diving into Glass* is her first work of autobiography.

# Strathbogie Shire Council seeks community input to help shape planning strategies

Council is embarking on a significant initiative to shape the future of our municipality with the development of a Rural and Residential Land Use Strategy (RRLUS) and Urban Growth Strategy (UGS). These key strategies will provide a blueprint for land use planning decisions over the next 15-30 years. To ensure a comprehensive approach, Council has engaged a team of experienced planning and engagement specialists to support the development of these Strategies.

Council is seeking community input through broad community engagement from 11 November to 13 December 2024 before an independently facilitated Community Panel meets in Late February 2025 to help inform the direction of these key Strategies.

Community members are encouraged to share thoughts that will help Council plan the locations of future residential development. This can be done by completing the online survey or attending a local drop-in event to learn more. Detailed information can be found at share.strathbogie.vic.gov.au/RRLUS-and-UGS.

Additionally, Council is inviting passionate individuals to join a Community Panel that will develop and present recommendations to help us create the RRLUS and UGS. • Community Panel session 1: Tuesday 13 February 2025, 5:00pm - 6:30pm (online) • Community Panel session 2: Saturday 22 February 2025, 9:00am - 3:00pm (in person in Euroa) • Community Panel session 3: Tuesday 27 February 2025, 5:00pm - 6:30pm (online)

Mr Tamlin, "No prior expertise is necessary—just an open mind, a willingness to work collaboratively, and a commitment to attend three sessions in February." The Community Panel will hear from planning experts and come up with considered recommendations to inform the preparation of the RRLUS and UGS. These OFFICIAL recommendations will be presented to the newly elected Council in 2025 through a Council workshop in March.

Expressions of interest are now open for up to 30 community members (18 years and older) to join a randomly selected Community Panel. Participants will receive a \$100 gift card to recognise their valuable time commitment upon completion of the sessions. 

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

### Next year the way you recycle at home is changing for the better



Strathbogie Shire Council is pleased to announce the rollout of a new purple glass recycling bin for households, the rollout is set to begin in May 2025. Distribution will take several weeks to ensure that every eligible household across the shire receives their new bin. Glass recycling collections will be scheduled to begin in July 2025. The new purple bins will be collected once every four weeks.

Council's waste data shows that 17 percent of the community's mixed recycling is made up of glass bottles and jars. However, when glass is broken and mixed with other items like cardboard, paper and plastic it is harder to recycle these materials. By putting glass bottles and jars in a

separate bin, more of these materials can be recycled into new items.

Strathbogie Shire's Interim CEO Tim Tamlin said we are preparing for this fourth bin next year as part of a broader state-wide effort to improve recycling practices and ensure more items are recycled effectively. 'By changing how we sort our waste and recycle at home, more glass bottles and jars can be turned into things like sand replacement for concrete and new glass jars.

#### How the new system works

'Our current three bin system has been working fantastically well and the move to a new four bin system will help further improve our recycling,' Mr Tamlin said.

Next year residents will be able to separate their waste and recycling into four streams;

- ☐ Glass recycling (purple bin)
- ☐ Mixed recycling (yellow bin)
- ☐ General rubbish (red bin)
- ☐ Food and garden organics (green bin)

Council will continue to provide more information to residents on how to use their new purple bin leading up to the rollout. Until then, households should keep using the yellow bin for recycling glass as normal.



#### The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

A Long Petal of the Sea by Isabel Allende, Plaza & Janes (Penguin Random House, Spain/Portugal/Latin America), 2019. (Translation by N. Caistor & A. Hopkinson)



Victor and Roser Dalmau, who leave their home at the brink of WWII, arrive in Chile after much hardship, loss and suffering and it becomes their home for many years. They have married out of the need to survive, out of family loyalty, out of love for her son and his nephew, and they stay together for many years out of love. The story of their relationship, who they are as individuals, and who they become together is the heart of the story, but the soul of this family saga is what Allende herself knows and experienced in the Chile where she was raised. The story became even more poignant after reading Allende's Acknowledgements at the end of the book, where she says: "This is a novel, but the events and historical individuals are real. The characters are fictional, inspired by people I've known. I have had to imagine very little ....".

Allende's novel instructs the reader through her depiction of the Spanish Civil War and the subsequent emigration of thousands of refugees, many of whom end up in Chile. It puts a very human face on a conflict that, for many readers, will be a small segment of high school history lessons. The rich detail and the deep empathy displayed in her writing endears us to the characters and enlarges our understanding of human behaviour.




Isabel Allende Llona is a Chilean-American novelist. Allende, who often writes in the "magic realism" tradition, is considered one of the first successful women novelists in Latin America. She has written novels based in part on her own experiences, often focusing on the experiences of women, weaving myth and realism together. She has lectured and done extensive book tours and has taught literature at several US colleges. She currently resides in California with her husband. Allende adopted U.S.

Mum and Dad by Joanna Trollope, Macmillan, 2020



Definitely a book for the summer hols. Mum and Dad is an easy read. pleasant enough, but sometimes just a bit too neat. The parents in this family 'drama', Gus and Monica, have been English expatriates in Spain for twentyfive years. Gus has built up a profitable and respected vineyard, of which he is extremely protective and possessive. However, life intervenes: Gus suffers a stroke, presenting the couple and their adult children with quite a dilemma. The ensuing 'drama' is the vehicle by which Joanna Trollope explores the not -so-smooth sibling relationships that come into play. Many readers will identify with this scenario: ageing and increasingly infirm parents and the firm and quite divergent ideas that their children have of what's best for them. Unfortunately, and for some families, quite recognisable are the vested interests that Gus and Monica's children hide under the guise of selflessness and sacrifice. The construction of this novel displays Trollope's ease-of-hand as a prolific and successful author; however, as with too many novels, the resolution of the 'drama' as the novel draws to a close is just a little too neat a happy ending that belies the long-standing tensions between the very different young adults and their partners.


