Drive at a sensible speed to suit the conditions and time of day and, if you do encounter an injured animal or bird, please show compassion and call Wildlife Vic. They will register the case and locate the closest available carer to assist or euthanise as appropriate.

It is particularly important to slow down between dusk and dawn when animals are most active. This will reduce the risk not only to wildlife but also to you and your vehicle.

Wildlife on the Tableland is rich in biodiversity, with most species found nowhere else in the world. Protecting this unique wildlife is essential in safeguarding biodiversity and to ensure that this environment remains vibrant and safe.

There is already significant pressure on Tableland wild critters due to:

- habitat destruction and fragmentation from land clearing, housing construction and other developments
- extreme weather events such as heatwaves, storms, high winds, floods and fires
- introduced predators, such as cats and foxes. Safer Roads Strathbogie aims to advocate and promote safer driving to reduce the risk to human safety, as well as wildlife killed and injured on our roads. Email: saferroadsstrathbogie@gmail.com Crowe

Landcare Planting Day at Polly McQuinns



In August 2011 members of Strathbogie
Tableland Landcare Group, with help from
students from Northcote Secondary College
and the Strathbogie campus of Peranbin
Primary School planted hundreds of trees at
Polly McQuinns – primarily along the side of
the weir between the water's edge and Polly
McQuinns Road, but also on the far side.

Over the past 14 years the trees have grown significantly, with some trees up to 40 cm in diameter. There's now a healthy forest all along the water's edge, but a recent inspection of the site showed that many of the plastic tree guards used to protect the young trees were still in place or littering significantly.



So on 23rd February, with help from the Upper Goulburn Intrepid Landcare Group, around 15 volunteers collected plastic and generally tidied up the whole site. We have also located the original sign that was erected in 2011 and plan to update the information and re-erect it in the near future.

Thanks to all who attended and particular thanks to Strathbogie Landcare member, Leigh Redding and his colleagues from Upper Goulburn Intrepid Landcare for suggesting this project in the first instance and for everyone's help on the day.

Attached are two photos – one taken in Aug 2011 just after the planting was completed and the second on Sunday 23 Feb 2025.

The STAG Report

The following notes are from our most recent Strathbogie Tableland Action Group meeting, which was held on 16th February 2025

- Some members of our community (including Adrian) met with the Strathbogie Shire Council to give input into and discuss the Rural Residential Land Use and Urban Growth Strategy. This was the first of 3 meetings to be held over coming weeks to create a strategy for future development in the Shire.
- The standpipe/pump installation (which is part of the drought relief facility water tank, at the Strathbogie recreation ground) is on pause until funding becomes available.
- STAG has decided to fund Bogie Tree so it can be taken to the next level of subscription. The funds raised at the pizza night on 20th Feb will go towards this.
- People will be encouraged to better identify the location of stock on roads or when a branch/ tree is down on a road, when reporting it on Bogie Tree. They will also be encouraged to advise if the Council has been notified when a road is blocked or a tree on a road needs removal.
- The amount of rubbish dumped into the recycling bins at the rec ground is an ongoing concern. STAG are looking for community feedback on the most appropriate and effective way to go forward with this.
- The construction of the footpath from the rec ground to Main St Strathbogie will be funded in next (financial) year's budget.
- The hall committee and STAG along with Bogarts will hold a night of music and celebration at the Strathbogie Memorial Hall on 22nd March.

STAG are seeking another committee member. Anyone who is interested can email stag@strathbogie.org

Community bus service project: Marion and Crowe had a couple of zoom meetings with representatives from communities who have successfully established a bus service. This background research included meetings with volunteers from Venus Bay and also Avenel, who currently offer a weekly service between Avenel and Seymour. These conversations were valuable for learning about different options and funding models that might be relevant to a bus service between Strathbogie and Euroa. Any one willing to 'get on board' (excuse the pun) the Bogie Bus project would be most welcome. There has been much enthusiasm around the Tableland about the idea of a community bus. It has been suggested that the idea be lodged with Council as part of its current community consultation informing the next four year Council Plan. It is important that as many community members as possible express their hopes for a community bus by 2 March. This can be submitted online at www.share.strathbogie.vic.gov.au

Meanwhile, Marion has engaged with the State Government Department of Transport and Planning about potential funding as part of its Flexible Local Transport Solutions Program (FLTSP). State government funding is available for co-funded projects for small capital transport projects.





The Bookshelf - notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

Demon Copperhead by Barbara Kingsolver, Harper, 2022

Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction; Women's Prize for Fiction; James Tait Black Memorial Prize

Charles Dickens used his novels to highlight social issues, particularly poverty, neglect and abuse of children. His well-known novel David Copperfield describes the adventures of the eponymous orphaned character in his journey from childhood to maturity, against the bleak backdrop of Victorian-era poverty.

Acclaimed US author, Barbara Kingsolver, loosely adapts and modernises the storylines and characters of David Copperfield for her multi-award-winning novel, Demon Copperhead. Set in the poorest region of Kingsolver's native Appalachia, like Dickens, she drives strong messages about society's failure to properly address poverty, child abuse, domestic violence and drug abuse. These are confronting and depressing issues (at one point I set the book aside for weeks before continuing), but Demon's engaging character and lively narrative transcends the bleakness of his circumstances.

Demon's early life with his drug-addicted single mother and later, an abusive stepfather, helps us to see these terrible experiences through a child's eyes whilst, at the same time, to enjoy the pleasure of the small happinesses he finds in his life, and to admire his pragmatism and resilience. After his mother's death by overdose, he enters the foster care system, again encountering neglect and abuse. He meets an array of entertaining characters who play a large role in later events in his life. Demon eventually seeks out his formidable paternal grandmother. With her assistance he enters a golden period of his life, living with the supportive football coach and his tomboy daughter and succeeding on the football field. However, after an injury, he spirals into opioid dependence. The ravages of the opioid crisis in the United States are brutally illustrated as we experience its impacts on Demon, his young wife Dori, and their families, friends and community. Without giving away too many spoilers, at the end we are left with a sense of optimism as Demon enters a more tranquil phase of his life

Kingsolver's social justice messages are forceful at times, strongly condemning the societal biases against the rural poor, the systemic failures of foster care, the role of big pharma in perpetuating opioid dependency, and much more. Yet her writing is compelling, the novel moves quickly and Demon is so likeable that we find ourselves willing him on to find a better path forward. It's not the happiest novel you will read, but it is an absolute pleasure and will stay with you long after you finish.

Recipe of the Month

Cold Curry Soup

Serves 4

Ingredients

6 shallots

30g butter 2 tspns curry

powder

2 tbspns flour

1 litre vegetable or chicken stock

1 piece lemon rind

1 egg yolk

2 tbspns cream

Salt pepper

Chopped chives



Method

Chop shallots cook gently in butter until lightly golden. Add curry powder and flour, cook stirring for 2 minutes.


Remove from heat, gradually add stock, add lemon rind.

Puree in blender or sieve. Return to saucepan, season with salt and pepper. Add 2 tablespoons of the hot soup to combined beaten egg yolk and cream, then add this slowly to the soup stirring constantly. Reheat gently, stirring—do not boil.

Cool, then refrigerate. Serve topped with chopped chives or shallots.

The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

Stone Yard Devotional by Charlotte Wood, Allen & Unwin, 2023



The Guardian review terms this novel – the seventh by Australian author, Charlotte Wood – a 'quiet novel of immense power' and 'a powerful, generous book'. Indeed, this novel was one of three shortlisted for the prestigious Booker Prize.

The narrator, despairing of the world after toiling fruitlessly for years at species conservation, retires from her established marriage and retreats into a convent on the Monaro Plains in New South Wales. The order of nuns who become her 'society' is a contemplative one, where busy work and extended periods of silence are the way of life. The narrator, who remains nameless throughout the novel, has not undergone a religious conversion, or moved deeper into an established religious faith; in fact, in Catholic tradition, her despair is an unforgivable sin and, while she does seem to experience some feelings of redemption for wrongs committed, she does not alter in terms of her lack of religious faith.

There are three threads Wood probes that approach small 'h' horror; the discovery and return of the bones of a nun of the order who was raped and murdered while in Thailand on outreach mission work more than a decade earlier; a 'horrific' mouse plague that sorely tests the ingenuity and resilience of the convent dwellers; and the reappearance of Helen Parry, a nun/climate & social justice warrior, who was the victim of intense bullying at the

school both she and the narrator attended – the latter being an active and heartless participant in Helen's torment. Charlotte Wood has referred to these three threads in the novel's trajectory as 'visitations', or perhaps tests which allow for possible responses from these self-denying women, such as guilt, forgiveness, redemption, self-awareness, perhaps self-forgiveness. The tests can be seen as vehicles for addressing the question of what one does with the knowledge of having wronged others, of how we might right the damage we have done.

However, for all the praise heaped on this 'odd' book, and in spite of some passages of beautiful writing, we felt the novel in sum achieves only partial success. Missed opportunities for moving deeper into promising imagery, inconclusive treatment of threads that seem to peter out, the unexplored position of the narrator in this unusual setting and the sense of inertia in her 'spiritual' journey left us oddly dissatisfied. Perhaps the Bohomians have more soul-searching to do!

The Afrobiotics



Founded as a side-project from the much-larger Public Opinion Afro Orchestra, The Afrobiotics (fka The Public Opinion Six) began as a way of writing new material and getting inside the sounds of Afrobeat, but it didn't take long for the six musicians to discover they had found something unique and special - a sheer love of playing together in a much more intimate setting, creating a more well-rounded dialog and interplay between each other. Where The Public Opinion delivers a dynamic and captivating show, The Afrobiotics is less sensory and more spiritual.

Out of this fertile foundation, Senegalese multi-instrumentalist Lamine Sonko began introducing the Sabar to the group, resulting in a music reminiscent of Afrobeat but with more melodic twist and turns. 


